Measures. Government to extend or lift guidelines like curfew and mandatory quarantine put in place to curb spread of disease

Corona cases hit 320 as queries dog arrest of curfew offenders

Public health strategy has seen almost 1,000 people forced into government facilities for at least 14 days

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The government yesterday fell short of defending the decision to place under quarantine people who failed to observe the curfew, as Covid-19 cases rose to 320.

Health Director General Patrick Amoth and Chief Administrative Secretary Mercy Mwangangi could not justify this move, a public health strategy that has seen almost 1,000 people forced in government facilities for 14 days.

Dr Amoth defended the decision saying the individuals were assumed to have been exposed to the disease by failing to observe the 7pm to 5am curfew.

Improve the conditions

Dr Mwangangi said any decision made on quarantine was informed by World Health Organisation guidelines and global best practices that suspected cases of exposure to the virus needed to be isolated.

However, the individuals arrested are neither tested before being quarantined to determine if they have already contracted the disease nor asked about the history of their movement to find out if they could have come into contact with infected people.

As such, the government facilities, including schools and colleges, are being flooded with individuals, some who might be positive and others not.

"We are aware that the issue has generated a lot of debate. We are working to improve the conditions of the centres," said Mwangangi.

The CAS insisted that the quarantine approach was a worldwide public health measure. She said some of the positive cases reported in the country had emanated from the quarantine centres.

During the update on the Covid-19 situation yesterday, the Ministry of Health reported 17 new cases. The CAS said two cases were from mandatory quarantine centres while the rest were from contact tracing.

"The fact that they were picked by the surveillance team, it means they were living in the community," she said.

The 17 cases, all Kenyans, were from 668 samples tested in the last 24 hours. Twelve are from Mombasa and five from Nairobi.

Additionally, some six patients have tested negative, bringing the total number of

recoveries to 89.

"I am happy to announce that other than the two that are in Intensive Care Unit, the rest are mild cases and will hopefully be discharged in proper order of time," she said.

Amoth said some escapees from a quarantine centre in Nairobi had been traced to Kericho.

He insisted that the government had not criminalised the quarantine process but could not confirm whether the conditions were good.

"What we should do to improve the conditions, for those who are positive, we move them to isolation and those who test negative we allow them to go home and continue with self-quarantine," Amoth added.

While acknowledging that some of the measures put in place by the government, including mandatory quarantine, curfew, hand washing and wearing of masks in public places had played a role in containing the disease, Mwangangi said a meeting scheduled for Sunday would determine if they would be extended or lifted.

"We have come up with a matrix that will be evaluated this Sunday by the National Emergency Response Committee, which we will then see if they will be tightened or loosened," she said.

The Health CAS also noted that the over-reliance on sanitisers over soap and water as a measure to curb the spread of the virus was a misplaced priority.

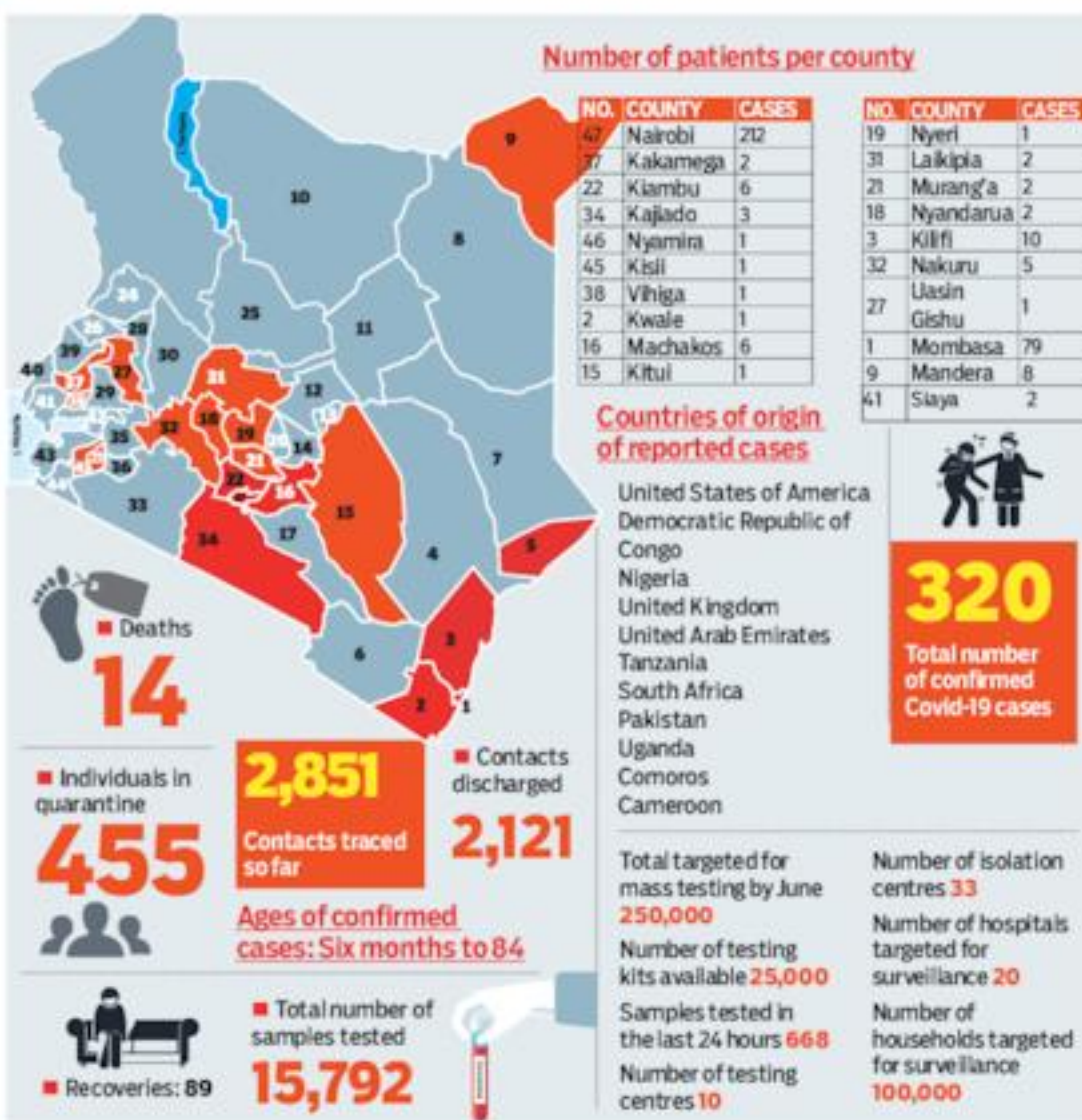

Finally, a glimmer of hope for Kenyans stranded abroad over travel ban

Hundreds of Kenyans stranded abroad due to Covid-19 travel ban have registered with embassies to help them return home.

The Kenyan citizens, who had travelled for business, work, medical issues and studies, are only banking on Kenyan offices in the countries where they are stranded to facilitate their travel.

For instance, a Kenya Airways flight carrying UK citizens is set to leave Jomo Kenyatta International Airport today at 9.30am for Heathrow airport in London

and is expected back on Saturday with some of the Kenyans who will go for a mandatory quarantine for 14 to 28 days at their expense.

Passengers who had booked to travel back to London and had not undergone the Covid-19 test at Lancet by 10am yesterday will not be allowed to board the flight.

This is because the airline had notified passengers to go for the test within 72 hours after receiving air tickets. They are expected to present a copy of medical

results at the check-in counter, showing they do not have Covid-19.

Aviation guidelines

"Kenya Airways is adhering to Ministry of Health and Kenya Civil Aviation Authority guidelines, which specifies kitting of all crew in protective garb and PPE, sanitising of the aircraft interior prior to and after flight. In addition, passengers on the flight will have medical certification allowing them to fly," said the airline's Director Corporate Commu-

nications and Public Affairs, Dennis Kashero.

Mr Kashero added that being a passenger flight, there was no requirement to have medics on board, adding that the airline's priority remains the safety and security of its customers, crew and staff.

However, sources within the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Health told *The Standard* yesterday that as at 4pm, the airline had not received clearance to fly to London.

In China, Ambassador Sarah Serem

said the embassy in Beijing had received 164 requests from Kenyans ready to meet the cost of travel from the foreign land.

Ms Serem said the embassy would issue emergency travel documents to those with missing passports and liaise with the host country to get some form of amnesty in cases of minor criminal offences.

In Turkey, Kenyans whose visas have expired are expected to contact the embassy's consular section. **[Everlyne Kwamboka]**

Pandemic

Sh18b boost for virus battle

Treasury has so far disbursed Sh18 billion to be used in Corona-virus-related interventions.

Treasury CS Ukur Yatani said the money has been released to boost the health sector, dig boreholes in slums and fund cash transfers to the elderly and other vulnerable groups.

The disbursement is part of a Sh40.3 billion war-chest to be spent on addressing adverse impacts of coronavirus pandemic.

According to the CS, more money is expected to be released today with the passage of a supplementary budget.

Treasury has allocated Sh13 billion to pay pending bills to small businesses and directed the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) to release tax refunds amounting to Sh10 billion. Some Sh10 billion has been released to fund a cash transfer programme for the elderly.

On Wednesday, Parliament passed a Tax Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2020 paving way for employees earning a monthly salary of less than Sh24,000 to be exempted from paying Pay-As-You Earn tax on their salaries.

Other employees will enjoy a five per cent tax relief.

Containing the virus

In a meeting with the National Assembly's Budget and Appropriations Committee, Yatani said the government had made significant efforts to contain the spread of the virus.

"We have in this regard provided Sh40.3 billion to mitigate against the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, which comprise Sh33.4 billion under recurrent and Sh6.9 billion under development," said the CS.

Maize farmers are set to benefit from Sh10 billion that the State has allocated to the Strategic Grain Reserve to be used for replenishing national silos.

According to Yatani, the Agriculture ministry is already in touch with select county governors inquiring about the availability of food within their regions.

The government will also disburse cash to people living in slums, with reports indicating that low-income households will get a monthly stipend of Sh2,000.

Also contained in the second supplementary estimates is a Sh400 million allocation to provide food relief and non food commodities in arid and semi-arid areas.

Treasury has allocated an additional Sh200 million to the police for enforcement and Sh200 million to prisons to combat the virus behind bars. [Dominic Omondi]

Uhuru secret card to form coalition with ODM, Kanu

Article 9 of the Jubilee constitution grants the party leader ultimate powers to run outfit and seek new alliances

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A clause in the Jubilee Party constitution suggesting President Uhuru Kenyatta has powers to enter into a coalition unilaterally has ignited a fresh storm.

Rival camps have bitterly clashed over the interpretation of the provision, largely viewed as the president's trump card in case he wants Jubilee to partner with Raila Odinga's ODM.

Mr Kenyatta's allies say the clause essentially allows the party leader to sidestep the hostile wing of the outfit that is allied to Deputy President William Ruto if he opts to enter a pact with other parties.

The interpretation of the party constitution by Uhuru allies - who have openly discussed a possible coalition with ODM and Baringo Senator Gideon Moi's Kanu - has rattled the DP's allies, who say it can be exploited to block Dr Ruto from running for president on Jubilee ticket in 2022.

New twist

And in a new twist, parties that merged to form Jubilee in the run-up to 2017 poll, said the Memorandum of Understanding that they deposited with the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties handed Uhuru ultimate authority in the running of the party.

Yesterday, the Jubilee National Advisory Council (NAC) - made up of two representatives from each of the 12 merged parties - through its chair Albert Nyaundi (Ford People) and Secretary General Hassan Osman (UDF), said the president was at liberty to enter any coalition in preparation for the elections.

Article 9 of the Jubilee constitution states that the party leader has ultimate powers over the running of the party and can choose to enter political co-operation with another party or coalition.

"The party leader shall promote political consultation, engagement and co-operation with other political parties and coalitions," reads Article 9(8).

Section 5 states that the party boss "shall have overall authority over the other officials and members of the party". The disclosure comes

barely a day after one of Ruto's allies claimed there was a ploy by Uhuru's wing to enter a coalition agreement with ODM and Kanu.

"We are aware that they want to steal the party and form a coalition with ODM and Kanu without our approval. That is why they want to pick people who sing their tunes to powerful positions," claimed Aldai MP Cornelly Serem.

Nyeri Town MP Ngunjiri Wambugu, his Nandi Hills counterpart Alfred Keter and former Nominated Senator Paul Njoroge said the same way Uhuru entered the handshake with Mr Odinga without consulting any party member is the same way he could initiate a coalition agreement if he wanted to.

Uhuru and Raila struck a truce after the disputed 2017 presidential election without consulting their political parties and only informed them of a deal after making a surprise joint press conference on the steps of Harambee House.

"When he entered the handshake with Raila, he didn't consult anybody. It is the same way he can enter a coalition. The party leader has the ultimate authority, but he would always want to carry the people with him. It is on that basis that he would inform them," said Mr Wambugu.

He said there was no way they would allow a rival camp to take control of the party to use as a vehicle for Ruto's presidential bid. "Whatever is happening in the party is an attempt by the Tangatanga wing to take control of the party for their 2022 plans. It is

like allowing one aspirant to take charge of a political party; it can't happen," said Wambugu. Keter told the Ruto camp to understand the powers of the party leader before getting into political shadowboxing.

"They should read the party constitution and understand the powers of the party leader. If he decides to form a coalition, he doesn't require approval from anyone. It seems they don't understand the implication of that clause," Keter added.

"Even if they (Ruto team) have numbers in the National Executive Committee, the party leader doesn't need to consult them if he decides to enter a coalition. If you read that Section 8 of Article 9 of the party constitution, it does not say the party leader will have to seek approval from any party organ. The constitution gives him the ultimate powers," said a senior party official who did not wish to be named.

But Deputy Secretary General and Soy MP Caleb Kositany, and his Kimilili counterpart Didmus Barasa insisted Uhuru

cannot unilaterally enter such an agreement without the endorsement of party organs.

Mr Kositany said the party cannot be run on the whims of an individual, adding that if the rival camp was keen on entering a political deal with Raila's party, its members should join the Orange party.

He maintained that entering a coalition entails rigorous processes and approvals from party organs. "Forming a coalition is a serious process. I would advise them to join ODM instead of pushing for a coalition which will have to follow the due process," said Kositany. He accused some politicians, whom he said claim to speak the mind of the president, of dragging Uhuru into political wrangles.

Drawing board

Mr Barasa said such a process would require a vote by members of the National Delegates Convention, which is the supreme organ of the party. "He can initiate such process but he would have to call NDC to endorse such a decision or reject it," he said.

"These people need to understand that the party belongs to the people, not a few individuals. If they think they can hijack the running of the party through such means, then they have to go back to the drawing board."

On Wednesday, Mr Nyaundi and Mr Osman held a meeting at a Nairobi hotel to discuss the ongoing wrangles in the ruling party. The meeting was attended by other NAC members, among them Benjamin Muema (New Ford Kenya),

Said Ali (Republican Congress Party), Petkay Miriti (Unity Patriotic Party of Kenya) and Kalembe Ndile (Tip Tip).

Osman said Uhuru was handed all the powers to run the party, including picking members of the National Executive Council and the National Management Committee, during the transition period.

"If you look at Clause Five of Article 9, it is clear the party leader has the ultimate powers during this transition period. Based on the MoU that we signed, the party leader is at liberty to work with any other party. In fact, we encourage him to do so for the unity of the country," he said.

Nyaundi added that he was surprised that members of the defunct United Republican Party were acting as if they were superior to the other parties that merged to form Jubilee. "When we signed the merger agreement, we unanimously agreed the party leader will have the ultimate powers to steer the party," he said.

"In that agreement, the party leader has powers to enter a coalition. As NAC, we want to encourage him to enter into any co-operation that will ensure peace."

Mr Njoroge, who sat in the Jubilee Party merger steering committee, said it was surprising that the deputy president was fighting for the control of the party when its leader was still in charge.

"I was in the steering committee in the merger of the 12 political parties. It is clear from the constitution that the party leader has the ultimate powers," he said.

Former First Lady Mama Njira Kenyatta yesterday donated food worth Sh20 million to 12 children's homes in Gatundu and Nairobi.

Mombasa**New ferry docks after 5-year wait**

The long-awaited ferry *Mv Safari* is expected to dock at the Kenya Ferry Services (KFS) jetty today.

The government procured *Mv Safari* and *Mv Jambo* from Turkey in 2015 for Sh2.1 billion. *Mv Jambo* was delivered in July 2017, but the construction of *Mv Safari* was halted by a court case.

According to KFS officials, the new vessel sailed into Indian Ocean waters yesterday.

Mombasa port hotspot for Covid-19 spread at Coast

Outcome of tests is disturbing because of how port operations at facility are intertwined with other sectors in coastal city.

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Three weeks after the first Covid-19 infection was reported at the Mombasa port, new infections have rapidly swept through the vital installation, striking fear in the 7,000-strong workforce.

The sense of foreboding is shared across Mombasa County, which by Wednesday's count, had recorded 67 infections.

Stung by the relentless march of the virus, mass diagnostic testing coordinated by the port, county and national governments, was launched on Sunday to determine the scope and extent of viral spread.

Three testing stations have been established at the office of the Dock Workers Union at Gate 5, Operations Conference Room and Container Terminal Operations.

In the first phase, authorities seek to test 1,000 people at the rate of 60 per day. Within days of the testing launch, 23 workers have tested positive for the virus.

Medical officials

The outcome of the tests is disturbing to epidemiologists and other medical officials because of how port operations are intertwined with other sectors in Mombasa.

The infection figure is set to rise as testing is enhanced. County health workers now believe the 23 infected port workers are a major source of transmission in Mombasa.

It was also not clear whether the county health officials had traced all the people the 23 had come into contact with. "The task of tracing their contacts is momentous," said one official of the committee established at the port to battle the virus.

"By yesterday, 23 infections had been recorded at the port," said Hazel Koitaba, the Mombasa Health executive, referring to Wednesday's national count that showed the coastal county had recorded 67 infections.

Ms Koitaba further revealed that "the first case" was reported at the port on March 30, and many more have been recorded.

"Most of the transmissions

at the port are happening at work among people who work closely," he said.

She indicated yesterday: "Since Sunday we have recorded 14 positive cases at the port and we expect this figure to rise as we ramp up mass testing capabilities. As long as we step up mass testing, we expect to pick more numbers."

Staff quarantine

According to Koitaba, some of the positive cases were picked from quarantine centres established specifically for port employees.

There are 65 employees in these centres. Some placed there in early March have since been freed after testing negative.

Meanwhile, an analysis of the statistics from the port shows 66 per cent of the positive cases are aged between 30 and 59, and equally spread on sex lines.

The executive was reluctant to discuss the reasons for the rapid spread of the virus at the port despite mounting criticism that authorities there were slow in putting in measures to prevent infections and responding when infections began to rise.

There is consensus among stakeholders that the port's first infections originated from foreign sailors who came into contact with port employees. But it is also evident that despite mitigation measures put in place after the fact, authorities were overwhelmed by the huge number of employees and inability to shut down key operations.

Port officials stringently deny reports that they were lax

or that foreign infected foreign sailors died within the port or interacted with port workers, denials that cannot be independently confirmed.

William Ruto, the general manager and harbour master in charge of movement of ships at the port maintains that no crew of any visiting vessel calling at the Port of the Mombasa has tested positive for the virus.

Captain Ruto said all vessels arriving at the Port must declare the health status of the crew including providing health records for the vessels' ten port calls.

"Those (vessels) that originate from countries that are coronavirus hot spots are subjected to vigorous inspection and crew prohibited from leaving the ship," Ruto told *The*

Standard. According to acting Kenya Ports Authority Managing Director Rashid Salim, most of the infections have been recorded in the container Terminal, Operations and Conventional Cargo departments.

The common denominator among these departments is that they have a lot of employees working in close quarters and most of their duties involve widespread exchange of documents.

Interaction

These departments interact very much with foreigners and other port users, including from Container Freight Stations.

James Onyango Oyugi, whose controversial nocturnal burial in Siaya sparked outrage two weeks ago, worked in the Conventional Cargo Department, which has recorded five infections. According to the government, Oyugi died from Covid-19 complications.

Ursula Buluma, the first reported case and death at the port, worked in the Welfare department, which is adjacent

to the Conventional Cargo department.

Like Oyugi, Buluma had underlying health issues and had also gone to a funeral in Kilifi, where an infected person was present.

Because of its very utility, most port operations cannot shut down. This means that there has been a continuous flow of cargo from Uganda, overseas and other countries by sea and road.

Last Wednesday two Kenyan drivers who had transported goods from the port to Uganda tested positive. They are isolated in Makindu.

Following the rapid spread of the virus, various State departments and parastatals hosted at the port, such as the Kenya Revenue Authority and National Transport and Safety Authority, have recalled their employees and scaled down operations.

KRA is now encouraging online clearance of cargo to avoid congestion and human interaction. It has since sent employees in non-strategic departments, those with pre-existing conditions or those aged 58 or above home to stem community spread.

Meanwhile, Koitaba believes the initial infections at the port originated from outside Mombasa and that the nature of economic activity has contributed to the subsequent spread.

"Mombasa is Kenya's second city and because of the economic activity here many people come in and out," Koitaba says.

But she notes that port workers, like other citizens, must exercise personal hygiene and social distancing.

It has come to our attention that some unscrupulous persons are sending messages to mobile subscribers and on social media platforms purportedly to caution recipients that they have exceeded the maximum number of SIM cards allowed per subscriber.

The messages are crafted to appear as originating from the Communications Commission of Kenya (CCK), the predecessor to the Communications Authority of Kenya (CA). A telephone number is also provided purportedly to enable recipients secure further assistance.

We wish to urge the public to ignore these messages, as they do not emanate from CA but from criminals, who are out to trick recipients into divulging personal information, including ID card numbers and other important details for fraudulent purposes.

This type of scam is referred to as Smishing where fraudsters send SMS texts purported to originate from a reputable company with the express purpose of tricking subscribers into revealing personal information. The criminals use the information so obtained, including ID, usernames, passwords, PIN, and credit card details, to steal money from the recipient.

It is important for the public to note that mobile operators (or their agents) are the only entities authorized to register SIM cards. As the ICT sector regulatory agency, CA, therefore, would have no business seeking personal information from mobile subscribers for purposes of registration.

Ally says DP owns Ruai land but won't contest eviction

Osero, his associate, says DP has legitimate title to the property in question and thus no one should lay claim to it.

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Deputy President William Ruto will not be challenging the repossession of the Ruai sewerage land, a close ally and business partner says.

Patrick Osero, who co-owns Weston Hotel with Dr Ruto, termed the Wednesday eviction of Renton Company from the contested property as malicious.

"He will not contest the repossession. He (DP) has a legitimate title to the property in his house. How can anyone lay claim to it," Osero posed.

Osero claims he does not own any share of the property but was well aware about Ruto's ownership of the 1600-acre property through Renton Company where a private municipality was intended.

Saying he was an authority on any property owned by the DP, Osero said the land has not been collateralised to any lender as had been widely speculated.

Other documents, however, indicate that the firm may have at least sought to charge the property to Kenya Commercial Bank, currently trading as KCB, even though we could not immediately confirm whether funds were ever released.

But as it would emerge, Renton Company does not exist at the registry of companies even though there are several variants of the name. And Ruto is yet to speak out on the alleged grab, which is thought to have taken place in the mid-1990s.

Emmanuel Talam, the Director of Communication in the Deputy President's office, had on Wednesday denied Ruto's link to the property.

"As far as I know, the DP does not own that land. You can find that out from the registry and you know I do not work there," Mr Talam told *The Standard* on Wednesday when the demolition was ongoing.

2010 petition

Court documents, in a petition filed in 2010 by Renton Company against Nairobi City Council and former senior officials Philip Kisia and Tom Odongo, indicate that the firm had sought to charge the property to KCB and had also

sought to be connected to the electricity grid. However, Mr Odongo - then the director of Land and Planning - cautioned KCB against extending the facility, saying the land was indeed public and intended for expansion of the sewerage treatment plant.

Mr Kisia, who served as the town clerk for Nairobi City Council for three years until 2012, questioned the legiti-

macy of the allocation.

"If there is anything to show that the allocation followed due process then the alleged owners should seek compensation," he said.

Kisia added that the city council did not have the powers to allocate land meant for public use, in this case intended for the expansion of the sewerage treatment plant, to private entities.

NCC was formally granted the entire parcel of land registered as LR 12979/1 in 1996 where the sewerage works was already. It was part of LR 12979 which is 5,336.2 hectares (13,186 acres), according to the area survey maps.

Four portions were carved out of the swathe of land on which the city councillors intended to settle landless dwellers.

Renton and another firm associated with former MP Cyrus Jirongo were allocated two of the parcels measuring 1,600 and 1,000 acres respectively.

Court records indicate that Renton claims to have paid Sh18.2 million to NCC, but the claim was not backed up by any documents.

Mr Jirongo was able to charge the property to Kenya Post Bank Credit, which has since collapsed, in 1994 for Sh1

billion, a fact confirmed yesterday by the Kenya Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Mohamud Ahmed, the chief executive of KIDC, said the corporation was still holding on to the title deed, which he described as having been

"properly charged".

"...The title for the piece is with us duly charged," Ahmed said.

He could not immediately confirm how much Jirongo's loan has now swollen to, but it has previously been reported to have crossed Sh20 billion.

It is unclear whether Jirongo's portion of the land would also be repossessed considering the similarity in circumstances of allocation. Should it end in the same way, the KDIC would be left holding onto worthless papers.

Most details relating to the Renton land are captured in a petition filed by the late Jacob Juma challenging the ownership of the land.

Juma had moved to court jointly with ordinary squatters who had moved on to the 1,600-acre land.

In his petition, he termed the allocation as fraudulent and cited the record 55 minutes it took the formal grant of the land to NCC and the subsequent transfer to Renton.

"Prior to the transfer and registration of the suit land in favour of Renton Company Limited on April 12, 1996 at 10.25am, the land had been acquired by the government and reserved for construction of a sewer plant and expansion of sanitary facilities in the city.

Suit land

"The suit land having been reserved for public purposes under the provision of the Constitution and Government Land Act, it was not available for alienation...the grant in respect of the suit land was registered in favour of the City Council of Nairobi at 9.30am April 12, 1996 and then hurriedly transferred to the first respondent on the same day at 10.25am," read Juma's petition.

Besides the petition, a court had annulled the supposed allocation of the parcel to Renton Company.

In 2010, GG Gachih, the registrar of titles, cancelled the allocation of the land to private developers through a gazette notice which effectively meant that even the squatters would not have a claim on the land.

Gachih specifically pointed out LR 12979/3 granted to Jirongo and LR 12979/4 allocated to Renton as illegal and unconstitutional.

"Under the circumstances and in view of the public need and interest, the government revokes all the said titles," wrote the registrar.

Grave danger. Double body bags are used to ensure there is no leakage

Even the dead can infect the living with virus

Fluids from corpses can put the lives of those examining or handling bodies at risk, pathologist says.

It is possible for one to contract coronavirus from the body of a person who has died from Covid-19, a pathologist has said.

Emily Rogena (pictured), a professor in human pathology at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology, says corpses can expel fluids while they are being moved or transported, putting the lives of those examining or handling the bodies at risk.

"The virus can stick to surfaces for longer hours and that's why double body bags are used to ensure there is no leakage of body fluids," Prof Rogena, who is also a private forensic pathologist, says.

This revelation comes in the wake of reports that a Thai pathologist died from coronavirus after catching it from a body in what is believed to be the first case of its kind.

Infectious samples

According to a report authored by two doctors and published in the *Journal of Forensic and Legal Medicine*, the pathologist who worked in Bangkok came into contact with a Covid-19 corpse.

Rogena says pathologists are aware when dealing with samples that are highly-infectious by wearing personal protective equipment to limit exposure. Further, with the pandemic, they have recommended that fans not be used in mortuaries.

"During this pandemic, one can only carry out an autopsy if they are sure they are well trained for a particular technique they are using, and the surrounding must support the procedure they are doing, like the negative pressure rooms," she says.

"Also, one should have enough clinical information before starting a postmortem just to rule out the chance that the person died from Covid-19 by reviewing their clinical background."



Handling bodies

- At every point of handling human remains of a Covid-19 patient, appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) must be worn
- The body should be packed in double-leak proof body bags
- Disinfect the body bag and all visible surfaces with 0.5% Sodium hypochlorite (bleach)
- A public health official should be designated in advance to accompany the body from the hospital to the place of final disposition to ensure the safety of all those involved in the process
- Government guidance on the conduct of funerals which includes minimising the number of attendants to not more than 15 and ensuring social distancing

Rogena further advises her colleagues not perform postmortems in instances where a hospital physician has certified the patient died from the coronavirus disease.

Local pathologists have come together under the Kenya Association of Clinical Pathologists (KACP) to support the developments of systems for dealing with those who die from Covid-19.

The disease is classified as a group 3 (HG3) disease, like hepatitis B and C, tuberculosis and Sars, as its agents can easily spread in the community.

Rogena says if a pathologist is carrying out a proce-

dures and finds an infection in the lungs, they should stop immediately and disinfect the body to avoid the spread of the infection.

"Covid-19 is viremic and can be detected in blood, so any body fluid is potentially infective and that's why we use a packaging system that is leak-proof."

"Covid-19 is a respiratory pathogen and can be transmitted via respiratory droplets, but also through the blood of a viremic patient."

She adds that after the pandemic, Kenyan culture, when it comes to handling the dead and burials, might change as people adapt to new ways.

"Culture is determined by society and the community. Culture is not static, it has to change at some point and keep evolving in a positive way. People may see the good in faster disposal of bodies," she notes.

Rogena also asks the public not to stigmatise families whose kin die from the virus by making them feel like they are the cause or that they may also die.

"Health workers conducting the burials should ensure they follow stipulated burial policies so as to maintain the dignity of the dead. When disposing the dead, environmental safety should be observed. After the autopsy, the body should be packaged in a way that is safe for the environment and the grave should be a standard six feet deep to limit exposure," she adds.

Family involvement

Rogena says body viewing is limited to identification, with the next of kin supported to identify the body prior to the closure of the body bag.

"Grief is one of the stages families go through and they need counselling. This is where healthcare workers need to come in by giving the right information since burial is within 48 hours."

And as the number of those who become infected, sick and die from coronavirus increases, Rogena says pathologists will continue to follow their mandate to investigate and determine the cause and manner of death.

Kenyans stuck in China to fly home on May 1

Hundreds of Kenyans stranded in China will finally fly home on May 1, as the Kenyan Embassy in the country has communicated the date when a flight will be available.

Those who wish to travel back home will pay \$750 (Sh80,000) for the economy class ticket from Guangzhou to Nairobi.

The Kenyan Embassy in China yesterday said the airfare had been discounted and maintained that the government would only facilitate those who can afford the ticket.

"Cost of ticket will be borne by an individual who will personally book and pay for it on the platform provided by Kenya Airways," the embassy said in a communique to the Kenyans in China.

The new communication comes amid heightened criticism on how the Ministry of Foreign Affairs has handled the predicament of the Kenyans stuck in China, many of them students and business people, who have been unable to return home for lack of means. The Chinese government has grounded all planes to contain the spread of the novel coronavirus.

Some of the Kenyans have reported mistreatment in the Asian country, specifically Guangzhou. Videos of Africans being evicted from their houses in the city have been shared on social media.

Sarah Serem, Kenya's envoy to China, defending the embassy from accusations it had abandoned the Kenyans, said the embassy had helped everyone that was affected.

She said she had arranged alternative accommodation for the evicted Kenyans.

In its notice yesterday, Ms Serem's office emphasised that it was not evacuating anyone, but merely facilitating their travel.

They will also require a Covid-19 clearance certificate. [Allan Mungai]

Principals ultimatum if schools are to open

National examinations could be delayed by another three weeks to fully recover the four weeks lost in term one.

It is now emerging that the government may only have up to the end of June to recall candidates to school to cover the syllabus and have equal chance to sit the national examinations.

Interviews with teachers and education experts reveal that anything beyond June will force the government to make serious adjustments, which may disadvantage some candidates.

With three weeks already lost during first term, teachers said another delay beyond June will pose a huge challenge in covering the syllabus and preparing children for examinations. Secondary school heads said by the end of June, some 11 weeks will have been lost, arguing that any additional week would not be easily recovered.

Kenya Secondary School Heads Association (Kessha) national chairman Kahi Indimuli said schools can adjust to covering the syllabus and prepare the candidates.

"We can reduce the August holiday to recover the first three weeks lost in first term and seek ways of getting back the four weeks lost in May,"

said Indimuli.

According to the 2020 school calendar, second term was scheduled to start on May 4 and to last 14 weeks with the closing date set for August 7.

The one-week half-term scheduled for June 15-19 would be used to recover some of the lost time. Third term was to start on August 31 and end on October 30 to pave way for the national examinations. KneC examination timetable shows KCPE was to start on October 27 and KCSE on November 2.

Time lost

Indimuli said the national examinations could be delayed by another three weeks so as to fully recover the four weeks lost in June.

"This means we may start national examinations towards end of November and complete it before Christmas time. Marking could even be done next year as was the practice long before the reforms," said Indimuli.

Kenya Union of Post Primary Education Teachers (Kuppet) Secretary General Akello Misori cautioned that beyond June, a whole term will have been lost and it would never be the same.

According to this year's school calendar, first and second terms were to last 14 weeks. Third term for primary schools was to last nine weeks and 10 weeks for secondary schools.

"With more than 11 weeks gone, we may not have an

express learning with examinations in mind. A time will come when it is impossible," said Misori.

KneC Secretary General Wilson Sossion, however, believes there shall be adequate time to prepare students for national examinations post coronavirus.

"The syllabus is as good as done in most schools; what is remaining is revision and preparing students for the examinations," said Sossion.

Parents, however, said they will not release their children to schools unless the coronavirus curve is flattened.

"Parents' fear remains the safety of their children, whether candidates or in lower classes. This will all depend on the coronavirus curve," said Nicholas Maiyo, the national chairman of parents.

He further said that before children go back to schools, they must be screened and those infected isolated.

"They all come from diverse counties some with many cas-

es registered and this will affect learning if proper measures are not taken into consideration," said Maiyo.

Kenya Primary School Heads Association (Kepsa) national chairman Nicholas Gathemia, however, said teachers will be ready to teach as long as their safety and those of children are guaranteed.

"As long as we are assured that children and teachers will be safe, we shall support the government initiative," said Gathemia.

In an interview with *The Standard*, Indimuli said with the proposed adjustments, it would be practical to retain the January to September school calendar.

Adjust calendar

"There must be exit and transition period for learners in an education system. If this does not happen then it means that the education calendar may be adjusted to start in September and end September next year to coincide with uni-

versities admissions time," said Indimuli.

However, he said, this may pose serious challenges because students may be forced to sit in same class for another year.

"This will come with a lot of stress among the learners. The other question will be what happens to Grade 4 pupils in Competency Based Curriculum (CBC). Will they repeat or will they be moved to the 8-4-4 system," said Indimuli.

Secondary school heads said if Kenyans comply with health directives on management of Covid-19 and candidates are sent to school before end of June, teachers would do their best to cope.

Indimuli advised that before schools open, the Ministry of Health must fumigate all the institutions and shelf plans to use them as isolation centres.

"They should also provide face masks and sanitisers for use in schools by the candidates, teachers and the lean support staff," said Indimuli.

Human-wildlife conflict

KWS clashes with community after poisoning of 18 birds and jackal

Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) has protested the poisoning of rare birds by the pastoralist community in Rumuruti, Laikipia County.

KWS said the 18 birds died after eating poisoned camel carcass preyed upon by a lion.

The agency explained that the carcasses of the two camels were poisoned and released to the wild as a retaliation for lions preying on livestock.

"The owner of two camels that were preyed upon by a lion has

been held over the incident. Two camels that had been missing from a boma for four days were killed by a lion whose foot marks were identified in the vicinity," read a post on KWS Facebook page.

In a statement issued by Laikipia Farmers Association (LFA), the community said they resorted to poisoning wildlife due to high cases of killing of livestock by predators, with no intervention or compensation from KWS.

"This community has suffered

enormously from predation over the last few months, now totalling 10 cows, four camels and a sheep. Living in Laikipia, for both farmers and pastoralists, comes with many challenges, mostly due to human-wildlife conflict," said LFA communications officer Camilla McConnell.

Ms McConnell said in retaliation to killings of livestock, the community often resorted to wildlife poisoning.

"A carcass will be contaminated with whatever chemical easily

available, usually some form of pesticide. It is then left for the lions to eat and die. Scavengers like jackals, hyenas, vultures, eagles, storks following the predators also become victims of poisoning," she said.

"A poisoned carcass can remain toxic for at least a week depending on the weather and dosage. This means it can continue to cause more casualties than intended," she said.

As organisations and conservancies strive to find workable

solutions to human-wildlife coexistence, LFA stated that particular animals were dangerous and posed risks to the community.

"If the habits go unchecked for too long, the animals will attack livestock and people, leading to disastrous injury," she added.

McConnell further said the disastrous repercussions of poisoning predators had led to a steep decline in vulture populations over the last decade, to the point they are now considered critically endangered.

KWS noted that the latest case claimed 11 rufous vultures, seven tawny eagles and one silver jackal, all endangered species.

"Samples from the vultures are with the Government Chemist for analysis, while the carcasses have been disposed of to prevent potential spread of disease. KWS is working with the local administration and Directorate of Criminal Investigations to determine the source of the poison," read the statement. [Jacinta Mutura]

SCAM ON SIM CARD REGISTRATION AND OWNERSHIP

It has come to our attention that some unscrupulous persons are sending messages to mobile subscribers and on social media platforms purportedly to caution recipients that they have exceeded the maximum number of SIM cards allowed per subscriber.

The messages are crafted to appear as originating from the Communications Commission of Kenya (CCK), the predecessor to the Communications Authority of Kenya (CA). A telephone number is also provided purportedly to enable recipients secure further assistance.

We wish to urge the public to ignore these messages, as they do not emanate from CA but from criminals, who are out to trick recipients into divulging personal information, including ID card numbers and other important details for fraudulent purposes.

This type of scam is referred to as Smishing where fraudsters send SMS texts purporting to originate from a reputable company with the express purpose of tricking subscribers into revealing personal information. The criminals use the information so obtained, including ID, usernames, passwords, PIN, and credit card details, to steal money from the recipient.

It is important for the public to note that mobile operators (or their agents) are the only entities authorized to register SIM cards. As the ICT sector regulatory agency, CA, therefore, would have no business seeking personal information from mobile subscribers for purposes of registration.

Medics on strike over March pay

Operations at Garissa referral hospital were paralysed yesterday after healthcare workers downed tools over last month's pay.

The workers, who converged at the county's biggest hospital, vowed not to resume work until their demands are met, saying they gave authorities enough time to solve the issues.

The healthcare workers striking included doctors, nurses, paediatricians, pharmacists, nutritionists, lab technologists, dentists, nurses and clinicians.

Subordinate staff in the hospital also downed their tools.

The region's acting Kenya Medical Practitioners, Pharmacists and Dentists Union spokesman Hassan Abdi Mohamed said over the last three years their salaries had always delayed. "You can imagine it is April 23, yet healthcare workers have not been paid March salaries. We won't resume duty until salaries are paid," he said.

He added that leave allowances for the workers had not been paid and some of them had not been promoted for five years.

"The county government has not been remitting statutory fees, including NHIF, NSSF and union subscriptions," said Dr Abdi.

The strike comes at a time the country is battling coronavirus, a global pandemic that has claimed thousands of lives, including healthcare workers in the front line.

The union officials feared the county administration was ill prepared in case a patient tested positive for Covid-19, saying Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs) were not available.

"It will be very difficult for us to fight Covid-19 in case of an outbreak because there are only 15 beds, inadequate PPEs and no single ventilator," Abdi said.

Yesterday patients were turned away from the medical facility on arrival while those admitted were taken back by relatives.

The newborn baby unit was at high risk, as no one was around to give care. [Abdimalik Hajir]

CS Munya cracks the whip on brokers in new tea sale rules

In a bold attempt to end Kenya's dubious distinction as top exporter of cheap bulk tea, value addition for 40 per cent of auctioned tea must be done locally.

Tea buyers at the Mombasa tea auction will be expected to carry out value addition locally before shipping, if a set of rules awaiting public participation sails through.

In a move expected to improve prices and create thousands of jobs, the rules proposed for the tea sector demand that buyers locally add value to at least 40 per cent of all tea bought at the Mombasa auction.

The regulations are expected to end bulk exports of Kenyan tea, which is then blended and packaged overseas, making it more lucrative.

The Tea Industry Regulations (2020) currently at the public participation stage, give current buyers and exporters at the Mombasa tea auction a two-year window to comply or lose their licences.

"All persons registered as tea buyers/exporters shall submit to the authority a return on quarterly basis indicating their level of compliance with provisions of this regulation," states the proposed law.

Table business plan

The buyers will also be required to present to the Agriculture and Food Authority (AFA) an elaborate business plan on how they intend to undertake value addition, create new market linkages as well as employment and technology transfer to local communities.

transfer to local communities. Almost 90 per cent of tea produced in Kenya is exported in bulk, after which it is blended and packaged, in the process multiplying in value. The tradition has robbed local producers better prices and exported packaging jobs abroad.

All local tea packers must be registered and file monthly returns to AFA copied to their county governments.

Tea brokers, who have traditionally been self-regulating under the East African Tea Trade Association (EATTA) that runs the Mombasa Tea Auction will also be on the AFA radar.

The authority will have powers to lock out any person or firm found to have taken part in any business practice in the tea value chain that is deemed fraudulent, prejudicial, and improper or which discredits

Proposed rules

- Buyers to carry out value addition locally on at least 40 per cent of all tea bought
- Buyers to present business plans to the Agriculture and Food Authority (AFA)
- All local tea packers to be registered and to file monthly returns to AFA
- Directors or entities whose licences or registration have previously been revoked or suspended barred from tea auction
- Tea auctions to be conducted electronically
- East African Tea Trade Association to seek a tea auctioning license

their method of doing business.

Also to be barred from tea brokerage business are directors of a company or entity whose licence or registration certificate has previously been revoked or suspended by AFA for any reason.

Additionally, every buyer, exporter, importer and broker shall file monthly returns on tea bought in the preceding month and the source and destination of the same.

The regulations also give timelines for newly registered players in the tea sector. "A person who applies to be registered as a tea buyer, exporter, importer, broker, packer or auction organiser shall commence operations within one year from the date of issuance of a registration certificate," proposes the regulations.

The tea brokers association will be expected to seek a

license to be an auction organiser in a provision that allows other operators to establish similar platforms.

All registered auction organisers will be required to establish an electronic trading platform.

And tea farmers in Murang'a are seeking reduction of management agency fee from 2.5 per cent to 1.5 per cent.

Supporting proposed reforms in the sector, the farmers' spokespersons Wambugu Gachurui and Njeri Waiyaka said the current management agency fee was exploitative. They asked that an agent be limited to a maximum 15 tea factories.

They also recommended a reduction in the number of directors in each factory, saying current numbers were too high. [Additional reporting by Boniface Gikandi]

Mombasa. Two thugs killed in shootout

■ Two suspected gangsters were gunned down by police in a dramatic shootout at Nyali bridge in Mombasa. According to a police source, the suspects had robbed a wholesale shop in Makupa and escaped using a motorcycle. Nyali Sub-county

Police Commander Daniel Mumasaba said the officers who were on patrol on Wednesday evening enforcing the ongoing curfew heard commotion and responded. Details of the gunmen and their motorcycle were shared and a chase was activated. The suspects were gunned down when they refused to surrender. "We alerted our officers manning the Nyali bridge roadblock while other officers from Makupa chased after the thugs. They managed to catch up with the suspects who defied orders to surrender," said Mumasaba. One of the thugs threw his gun into the ocean. [Weldon Kipkemoi]

Nakuru. Three beaches closed to the public

■ The government has directed that three of the four beaches around Lake Naivasha be closed after they were submerged following the ongoing heavy rains. Residents of Kihoto village, which borders the lake, have also been ordered to shift to higher ground following the sharp rise in water levels. The move comes a couple of days after rivers Karati and Malewa, which empty their waters into the lake, burst their banks following the rains. Naivasha Sub-county Commissioner Mathioya Mbogo identified the affected beaches as Karagita,

Central and Kamere, adding that nearly all structures on them were submerged and posed a health hazard. While issuing the directive, Mr Mbogo noted that the facilities were a major health threat not only to fishermen but also to their customers, and asked traders to shift to safer beaches. "We have agreed with them (fishermen) that they will not operate from the facilities in their current state and they have started moving out," he said. Mbogo further added that the county has banned the transportation of fish using personal cars and public service vehicles to curb the spread of Covid-19. [Anthony Gitonga]

■ A senior health officer has been sent on compulsory leave for allegedly inciting fellow health workers and jeopardising the war against Covid-19. From Sonko to Badi, Nairobi needs more work and less petty dramas

Nairobians should not be saddled with litigation that adds no value to their lives

In a ridiculous twist of events, Nairobi Governor Mike Sonko wants to reverse the recent transfer of four key functions to the national government.

Completely out of the blue in February this year, the Nairobi County government transferred health, transport services, public works, and planning and development functions to the national government following mutual agreement.

In highly publicised protocol, Sonko was seen signing the deed of transfer on behalf of the county government, while Cabinet Secretary for Devolution Eugene Wamalwa signed on behalf of the national government. President Uhuru Kenyatta was a witness to that ceremony.

Slightly over a month after the transfer, Sonko appears to have changed his mind. However, it is a little too late in the day for him to renege on a deal he willingly signed, for several reasons.

From the outset, there was a general feeling that the transfer had not followed the right procedure. Ideally, it should have accommodated the input of all stakeholders.

First, the transfer was not deliberated upon in the county assembly to give it legitimacy through the endorsement of a majority of MCAs, and sec-

ond, it was not subjected to public participation. Had that been observed, the excuses Sonko now advances that he did not read the deed of transfer would not have arisen. If anything, the admission that he did not read the deed vindicates those who have held the view that Sonko was not cut out for the job of running a complex metropolis like Nairobi, which also holds the seat of power of the national government.

Since Sonko has hardly demonstrated that he is up to the task, the needs of Nairobians now deserve to be properly seen to by the apolitical Nairobi Metropolitan Services under Maj Gen Mohamed Badi, in accordance with the agreement that the city's governor signed.

There should be no turning back, and the agreement should be allowed to run its full course as a done deal. Nairobians should not be saddled with litigation that adds no value to their lives.

Yet, to dismiss Sonko's claim that some people are trying to frustrate him would be injudicious. For instance, the proposal by MPs that the 2020-2021 budget allocation for Nairobi be held in the Consolidated Fund is mischievous. The deed of transfer did not mean Nairobi County should be starved of funds.

Enforcement of Covid-19 laws must be reasonable

Social media has been abuzz with Kenyans complaining of State heavy-handedness while enforcing regulations designed to curb Covid-19, such as the requirement to wear face masks while in public, the national curfew and certain travel restrictions.

Kenyans have complained of being arrested even before the curfew, while others claim to have been caught up because of medical emergencies or unfortunate events, such as vehicle breakdowns. Some essential service providers like medics have been harassed and beaten during curfew hours despite being exempt; others have complained of wrongful arrest, assault, extortion and quarantine.

On the other hand, there have been several instances where Kenyans have been caught flouting social distancing and curfew rules by throwing parties and religious ceremonies. These actions paint a bleak picture regarding whether Kenyans have internalised the existential threat that the coronavirus poses.

Legitimate aim

As a result of the arrogance and carelessness displayed by some, the government recently announced that those found outside of their houses during the curfew period would be assumed to have contacted coronavirus and placed under quarantine for 14 days.

Although the measure is understandably supposed to be a deterrent to Kenyans who are minded to violate government initiatives to curb the coronavirus, it raises fundamental issues regarding the constitutionality of the directive, keeping in mind that laws must be clear, reasonable, necessary and proportionate and pursue a legitimate aim.

Firstly, it raises pertinent issues regarding the rights of persons arrested and the right to a fair trial because the Constitution requires all arrested persons to be presented before a court within 24 hours and entitles them to bail and bond.

The Public Health Act also requires such persons to be arrested, charged and possibly fined Sh1,000. Moreover, only a court of law can allow the government to hold a person beyond this period in very spe-

cific circumstances.

Secondly, many question the rationale by the State that flouting curfew means a person is likely infected. Does the fact that you were outside past 7pm have a measurable correlation with your likelihood of infection - or is it a ploy to extrajudicially punish those flouting regulations?

Thirdly, the Sh20,000 fine for failure to wear a face mask may be considered overkill, considering that 37 per cent of Kenyans live on less than \$2 (Sh200) a day. It is noteworthy that face masks are scarce and expensive.

There is mounting evidence that police are using the harsh curfew provisions and the punitive punishment regarding face masks to extort Kenyans. The prospect of paying Sh20,000 or being forcibly quarantined is motivation enough to bribe an officer to let you go.

Kenyans have criticised police for enforcing the Covid-19 laws without observing the very regulations that they are enforcing. Most do not wear face masks, gloves or observe guidelines on social distancing. They are often seen in crowded vehicles and are very hands-on when arresting members of the public, exposing themselves to the coronavirus.

The irony is that the officers will interact and expose themselves to those violating regulations and proceed to deliver them to quarantine centres, while they, now exposed, continue interacting with other Kenyans in the line of duty.

Several State-run quarantine centres have also been criticised for being unsuitable for isolation and quarantining due to close proximity among those in quarantine, poor sanitation standards and the sharing of amenities such as toilets and showers.

The priority of every government intervention should be to save lives by slowing the spread of Covid-19 and ensuring adequate treatment of those infected. A bare minimum of such facilities is the real isolation of people for the required duration. To put people in a dormitory-like setting completely defeats the purpose of the exercise.

There is now a need for a delicate balance of public safety and public health. The government needs to deploy deliberate and judicious approaches in its interventions. If someone is found outside during curfew, the officers involved must be humane and use common sense to verify the reasons for violation.

The State should borrow the 'first do no harm' principle that requires that all interventions must not cause further or unnecessary damage or suffering.

KWS should stop ignoring farmers' desperate cries

Human-wildlife conflict is as old as our country. Whenever communities are under siege from wild animals, they seek help from the Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS).

However, a community that has persistently been pleading with the agency to intervene in their conflict with just one elephant is now convinced that KWS exists only on paper.

The residents of Jogoo Farm in Nakuru, who neighbour Koibatek Forest in Baringo County, have been spending sleepless nights since mid last year, thanks to the lone elephant that comes from the forest.

They have on numerous occasions asked the agency to relocate or rein in the animal, which destroys their crops, fences and other structures on a nightly basis, but one year down the line, the elephant is still wreak-

ing havoc.

Twice this year - in January and last week - *The Standard* has highlighted the plight of the farmers, but even that was not enough to jolt KWS into action.

This begs the questions: does KWS care about communities that are put through unspeakable suffering by wildlife? If it does, why has it not acted in this matter? If it cannot restrain one elephant, what happens in places like Laikipia where herds of elephants are known to invade villages?

KWS officials need to take the work they are paid to do more seriously. It's totally unacceptable for residents to complain for a whole year without any meaningful action being taken. It shows that some people are either sleeping on the job or don't care when 'small' people are terrorised by wildlife.

Plea bargaining boon for war on corruption

This is a new dispensation of an old statute; plea bargaining has been a part of the legal framework available in prosecution of cases, but at a rudimentary level, as explained by University of Nairobi scholar Buluma Bwire in 2008 in his academic paper titled, "The introduction of Plea Agreements into Kenyan Criminal Practice".

In his paper, Bwire argues that "the introduction of the Criminal Procedure Code (amendment) Bill in 2008, was long overdue, as plea agreements are a cardinal pillar of any legal system's criminal practice and their absence (up to that point) in the Kenyan legal system has been eminently lamentable."

The DPP's strategic approach for 2020, includes utilising section 137A of the Criminal Procedure Code to enter into agreement with an accused person or his representatives after negotiations regarding charges, in a sort of give-and-take agreement. In the case of the NYS banks, the fines paid are just part of the negotiated agreement and it is expected that their co-operation in investigations will also bear fruit for the prosecution.

Tackling corruption cases can be tedious, and often the process is slow and arduous, proceedings take months or even years of piecing together information, collaborating evidence, confirming witness testimonies and finding the right people to charge and the right laws to apply.

To understand how the NYS cases are being handled, you need to think of each outcome as a piece of a giant jigsaw puzzle, slowly being arranged and linked together, step by step until finally the final picture comes together.

Sometimes these pieces, like the plea bargaining agreement between the DPP and the banks looks like a set-back, after all, to any concerned citizen, the best outcome would be for all parties involved in a corruption case involving billions to be convicted and sent to jail. But if the big picture is kept in mind, these plea agreements should ultimately result in successful prosecution of what can be considered one of Kenya's most famous corruption cases.

Plea bargaining may well become more utilised in the fight against corruption, with the overall intent to ease the burden of these cases on the judicial system as well as to shorten the time taken and reduce the backlog of cases being handled by the DPP and the EACC. This by no means indicates that people are buying their freedom or escaping justice, rather it means that justice comes sooner and swifter for perpetrators.

2020 is a year of the surreal, we are living in a pandemic, entire countries have gone on lockdown, health-care professionals have become our first line of defence and entire government institutions have to finally become digitally savvy, conducting business via conference calls and somehow getting their work done while maintaining social distance and strict hygiene.

The changes necessitated by the Covid-19 government response may be long term; indeed, at this point in time, Kenya is just beginning to face the oncoming tsunami of infections if we compare our current trajectories with countries like Italy or the UK. It is likely that this unusual turn of events has likely permanently changed the way our society, economy and government works.

For institutions that were already ICT ready like the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions, the drastic changes in work culture due to Covid-19 responses are taken in stride. The measures taken by the ODPP include limiting access to their offices, provision of hand sanitizers and face masks to staff and embracing of conferencing technology such as Zoom for meetings and to link with other criminal justice actors such as the National Police Service, the Judiciary and the Kenya Prisons Services for serious cases that must be handled during this lockdown period.

Not to be deterred by the pandemic, in the fight against corruption, ODPP has adopted diversion and plea bargaining in high-profile corruption cases, with the first notable case involving five banks involved in the Sh11 billion NYS scandal, which has seen the lenders refund the taxpayer Sh385 million.

The five banks last year paid Sh271 million in fines for failing to report suspicious transactions to the Central Bank of Kenya (CBK) as required by the Banking Act and the industry regulator's guidelines. Director of Public Prosecutions Noordin Haji said in March that his office opted for the deal because the banks and their managers were not directly involved in the plunder of NYS. Their only crime, he said, was failure to report suspicious transactions.

Things are bad? You ain't seen nothing yet

As we come to the end of April, I fear that we must brace ourselves for a harrowing May. If we thought that the measures the government has taken so far to try and curb the Covid-19 pandemic are tough, I think we haven't seen anything yet.

Let us start with the basics. The numbers of newly confirmed Covid-19 infections that Health Cabinet Secretary Mutahi Kagwe will announce today happened two weeks ago. That means people who are confirmed today were infected two weeks ago, and in that time, the virus has been incubating in their bodies.

What's worse is that they have probably infected numerous others unknowingly as they went about their lives. This week we heard a series of stories that show that our behaviour will lead to an explosion of the number of infected people over the next two to three weeks. For instance, a Nakuru MCA died in a grisly car accident at the weekend. Videos shared on social media suggest the MCA had been at a party with friends on Saturday.

The video shows them breaking the social distancing rule as people hugged to welcome a new entrant to the party. One of them even warned, "Ha! You guys, you are not supposed to hug!" and then laughed. If the video is authentic, I have seen no reports of any action being taken against the friends of the MCA.

Drinks and bhang

We also saw a report of a Red Cross official who dispatched an ambulance to go and collect her child and the child's friends from a party where they had been drinking during curfew hours. This incident would have passed unnoticed had the youth in the ambulance not recorded themselves enjoying the ride and shared the video on social media.

A cursory look at social media platforms Instagram and Snapchat shows that many young people are not social distancing. I have been attending a series of Zoom conferences online organised by communications agency Thellesi Company and the Emerging Young Leaders Foundation, in which youth have been talking about their experiences. What I have heard from the mouths of these young people is chilling.

What many young people are doing is that they have been congregating during the day armed with drinks and bhang during lockdown hours to "have fun". Today at this house and tomorrow at another.

"I have had way more sex than I have ever had before the lockdown - I even wonder if the coil (contraceptive) will hold!" a young lady confessed in one of those calls.

"We have to smash to release stress," said another. For the uninitiated, 'smash' is a euphemism for having sex.

They went on to explain that they organise to visit each other for sex at their apartments and even admitted they sometimes have multiple partners.

According to Conrad Mochu, the CEO of Thellesi Company, Kenya should brace for a "reproductive health epidemic" in the coming months, as abortions, new HIV and STD infections, and unwanted pregnancies could increase, especially in young people in their 20s.

This week we also saw a chilling video of persons scaling a wall at Kenya Medical Training Institute in Nairobi to run away from quarantine. It was reported that about 50 people were involved in this 'prison break' and were yet to be captured by the time of writing this article.

Pictures released by activist Boniface Mwangi show quarantine centres in deplorable condition. The pictures show beds strewn in large dormitory-like halls with no social distancing. In each of the beds, people only have one blanket and no pillow. In some of those pictures, we saw people lying on the floor with nothing to cover them. Is it any wonder that people would run away?

Because of such conditions, people would be afraid to come out and volunteer themselves for quarantine.

"It's like a prison," a tweet read from someone allegedly in quarantine. It is no wonder that some unscrupulous policemen are taking advantage of the curfew regulations to demand bribes from people who face quarantine.

An idea the government should explore is using hotels that are currently empty as quarantine centres. The owners of the hotels can be asked to strip them down to the basics and the government should set aside an amount to pay the hotel owners for their trouble. This way, the hotels will gain some revenue during this difficult time and people can be quarantined with more dignity.

The time has come for us to all hold each other seriously accountable. As Mr Kagwe said on Wednesday this week, we must report people who are not behaving correctly. We must call out people who act to risk the lives of others. We must also hold the government accountable for its actions in handling this pandemic.

There should be public accounting of how the money that has been made available for this war is being spent, and we must call on CS Fred Matiang'i to actively investigate the conduct of the police and other officials taking advantage of these regulations for their personal gain.

It's time we faced up to our Achilles heel

It is uncanny how the convergence of events can validate one's reality so fully. The recent dealings with Covid-19 seem to have validated the government's focus on the Big Four Agenda.

Let me explain. Recently, we discovered how we need to bolster our healthcare system so that it can provide services to our population. We have been faced with the realisation that we need more healthcare workers, that we need more primary healthcare facilities, and more critically, that we need to have a stronger response system in times of healthcare emergencies.

The Universal Healthcare Pillar under the Big Four Agenda is geared towards strengthening service delivery in the health sector so that all Kenyans have access to quality healthcare at an affordable price.

Isn't it uncanny that this emergency highlights the importance of this pillar?

With the global supply chain strained with the need to supply medical equipment, personal protective equipment and even masks to prevent the spread of Covid-19, we have realised the importance of having a minimum amount of internal manufacturing capacity.

Again, the manufacturing pillar is so critical to creating new growth and putting people back to work. In addition, it has become extremely clear that there is a need to improve our performance in manufacturing so that we can respond adequately in times like these that require reliance on internal production systems.

It is quite apt then that the Big Four Agenda was seeking to strengthen manufacturing capacity.

Food security is perhaps the easiest to grasp as one of our critical areas of need as a nation. Realising that many people, especially in the urban centres, rely on purchases to feed themselves, it is no wonder that a total lockdown scenario would

be devastating for many.

Simply put, our urban centres rely heavily on trade to put food in the mouths of those whose lives are dependent on daily wages.

In addition, the production of food is in areas outside of our urban centres and it is important to keep trade lines open to keep our cities fed.

If farmers outside of cities are disincentivised through a collapse of markets in the city centres, for sure our food security will be in great jeopardy.

And now, of course, the importance of the food supply and production network in Kenya has been brought to the fore of our consciousness as we debate how best to stave off the spread of Covid-19.

However, it is now dawning to many that long before this disease, this administration was contemplating ways of helping us to secure food and nutrition for our population.

Lastly, the issue of affordable housing is also related to Covid-19. The fact that we have nearly 60 per cent of our urban population living in inhuman conditions, in great densities, in informal settlements and slums, has become an issue we need to confront.

The affordable housing programme sought to provide decent and adequate housing - with a certain minimum standard for access to acceptable sanitation services.

It has become apparent in these times of the pandemic that there is a direct relationship between health outcomes and the state of human settlements and the standard of living. This is not something new in public policy and it is a fact that has been acknowledged across all levels of government.

The Affordable Housing Programme (AHP), as part of its main interventions, sought to create well-planned cities with access to services that promote sustainable livelihoods.

From ensuring that people have housing units with water reticulation, decent bathrooms, access to energy, organised refuse collection and other services, AHP is a programme that sought to transform the way in which ordinary Kenyans experience daily living conditions.

It is possible to see how access to affordable housing, another of the pillars in the Big Four Agenda, is critical for responsiveness to the realities posed by Covid-19.

For us to create lasting disaster management, emergency response, improved public health indicators, and improved service delivery in urban areas, we must address how our human settlements are built, structured and financed.

This is the promise of affordable housing and we need to think on how best to keep this in our ambitions as a country.

Samson Adhanja: Positive thinking. Kudos Governor Alfred Mutua.

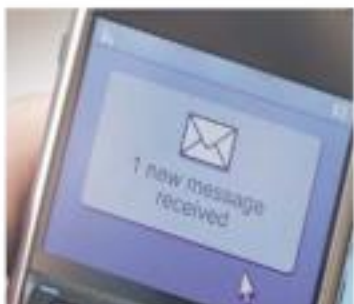

Local firms now churn out PPEs to meet high demand

Face masks will be subjected to quality tests by Kenya Bureau of Standards and Ministry of Health.

The war against coronavirus has been intensified with various manufacturers in Nakuru town increasing the output of their production lines to meet high demand for essential products.

The companies include textiles giant Bedi Investments, which was primarily producing garments for export to Europe. Jaswinder Bedi, the company manager, said they received approval from the government to produce Personal Protection Equipment (PPEs). They have since rolled out mass production.

"We have stopped production of garments for export and now focus on manufacturing PPEs. Kenya is at war with the virus and we must equip our frontline soldiers, who are the medics, for them to give their best," said Bedi.

He added that it took the company two weeks of research and consultation with global experts to have consensus on the quality of PPEs to produce.

"We are producing 5,000 sets of PPEs, which include masks and gowns. We had 400 workers, who would have been laid off but instead we employed more," said Bedi.

Higher production

The company now intends to expand its production and roll out 10,000 sets per day in the next one week to meet the local demand.

"Having changed the model of our business, we are looking

into supplying other neighbouring countries, but Kenya comes first," he said.

Bedi said the company will make a donation of masks to the local community and ensure the residents access them at subsidised costs.

Governor Lee Kinyanjui lauded the company's work, adding that his administration

will support the local manufacturers by procuring the products from them.

"The national government has approved the products from the textile factory. The county shall procure its next batch from the company to promote local industries during these tough economic times," said Kinyanjui.

A production line for hand sanitisers is under construction at the Menengai Oil Refineries, which specialises in manufacture of edible oil, soap and detergents. The company's General Manager, Nishil Sanghrajka, said demand for soap and sanitisers has grown exponentially since Covid-19 cases were reported in Kenya, which informed their decision to diversify.

"We are working on production of sanitisers. It was not among our products. In a week's time the production line will be up and running. We have also increased our soap production," said Sanghrajka.

The company, alongside Pepea Millers, which produces maize flour, made massive donations of soap and flour to the county emergency response committee for distribution to the needy.

Nakuru Royal Industries Chairman Yusuf Hassanali explained that the company increased its production capacity for water tanks necessary in supporting sanitation.

"We have donated water tanks to police stations and various households across the county. We have also subsidised our prices to make them more affordable during these hard times," said Hassanali.

Hands on deck

All Technical and Vocational Education and Training institutions in the county have been directed to start mass production of face masks in the wake of novel coronavirus pandemic.

The County Public Health Department has urged companies and institutions to make masks that meet standards set by the World Health Organisation.

"Principals and instructors have been informed on how the masks should be made to ensure they meet the set standards," said Governor Kinyanjui.

Masks from the institutions will further be subjected to quality tests as per the Kenya Bureau of Standards and Ministry of Health before they are made available for public use.

Mr Kinyanjui said they will provide the necessary materials for production of quality masks amid protests by a section of medics that what has been supplied was of low quality.

Meanwhile, the County Emergency Response Committee received foodstuff donations worth Sh300,000 from Nakuru business community led by Mwangi Muthee. The food will be given to vulnerable households in Kivumbini, Rhonda and Bondeni, among other low-income areas.

"We have donated maize flour, beans, cooking oil, and sanitisers. We ask other stakeholders to support the initiative," said Mr Muthee.

'Prison break'

Two suspects arrested after KMTC quarantine escape

Two of the 50 people who escaped from a mandatory government quarantine centre have been arrested in Marurui, Nairobi.

The escapees scaled a perimeter wall at the Kenya Medical Training College on Tuesday evening.

Witnesses said the victims were eating dinner when it started to rain and they saw security officers guarding the premises take cover.

They reportedly took advantage of the situation and jumped out.

The two suspects were on Wednesday

taken to the Kasarani chief's camp, awaiting the police to record their statements.

Officers said they would be taken back to the centres to complete the quarantine before being charged in court.

Curfew measures

President Uhuru Kenyatta on Wednesday said those who escaped from the facility would be arrested.

"You can't be a burden on law-abiding Kenyans if you were found violating curfew measures to tame Covid-19," he said.

Reports indicate that some of those

who escaped were still waiting for their Covid-19 test results after samples were taken to the lab.

Meanwhile, more than 200 people were on Monday arrested and detained by police officers in Nairobi after they broke the Public Health Act.

This took the number of people arrested so far and placed under forced quarantine at their cost to 506, said Nairobi Regional Commissioner Wilson Njega. Some of those arrested on Monday were, however, released later in the night after being granted police bonds.

More than 300 others had been rounded up at the weekend and detained before being taken to quarantine centres. They were arrested at roadblocks, clubs, homes, weddings and other social joints.

Mr Njega said Kilimani, Kasarani, Kayole and Buruburu had the highest number of people violating public health guidelines.

He said officers have so far arrested 1,088 people in the past week for flouting the rules. Some were taken to court and fined between Sh15,000 and Sh20,000 and told to self-isolate. **[Cyrus Ombati]**

Doctors cry foul over lack of PPEs and harassment

Doctors at the Kakamega County Referral Hospital have threatened to down their tools in a week's time if they are not protected from various forms of harassment by their senior officials.

In a memo to Governor Wycliffe Oparanya, which was signed by the Kenya Medical Practitioners Pharmacists and Dentists Union (KMPDU) western branch secretary Sande Charo, the doctors accused the County Health Executive Rachael Okumu and Chief Officer Beatrice Etemesi of high-handedness and intimidation.

They said the referral and other sub-county hospitals were ill-equipped to handle cases of coronavirus, should they arise, and their efforts to escalate the matter with the two top officers was met by intimidation, demotion and threat to transfer from the top county hospital.

Also, the medics allege Kakamega Teaching and Referral Hospital may not be operational in July, as envisaged by the governor, because consultant doctors who could not withstand the intimidation have resigned.

The memo, seen by *The Standard*, says the hospital has no adequate Personal Protective Equipment like surgical masks, gloves, among other requirements in the fight against Covid-19. This, despite claims by Mr Oparanya that his administration had set aside Sh85 million to buy the PPEs and pay allowances.

The doctors have demanded the two senior officers be moved from the health docket and be investigated over spending of Sh27 million meant for Community Health Volunteers.

"We beseech your office to intervene in this horrid environment, which is aimed at derailing the fight against Covid-19 and plunging Kakamega and the country into misery. If action is not taken, then we will have no option but to withdraw our labour until these grievances are addressed without further notice," reads the memo by Dr Charo.

They also complained of deplorable working environment for health care workers handling Covid-19 patients.

"These officers are working 24 hours without the simplest things like tea and lunch. They are not protected at all in addition to the long working hours," said a union member.

Charo said there exists a weak link between the health executives and medics in the fight against Covid-19, which has left health care workers exposed and at the risk of contracting the virus.

Antony Akoto, the KMPDU Western Branch chairman, said the county is yet to train health care workers on how to fight the pandemic. Ms Etemesi said she was aware of the matters raised, but declined to make any comment. [Nathan Ochunge]

Report says Nigerian John Apewajoye sustained 60 per cent burns in an alleged gas explosion incident.

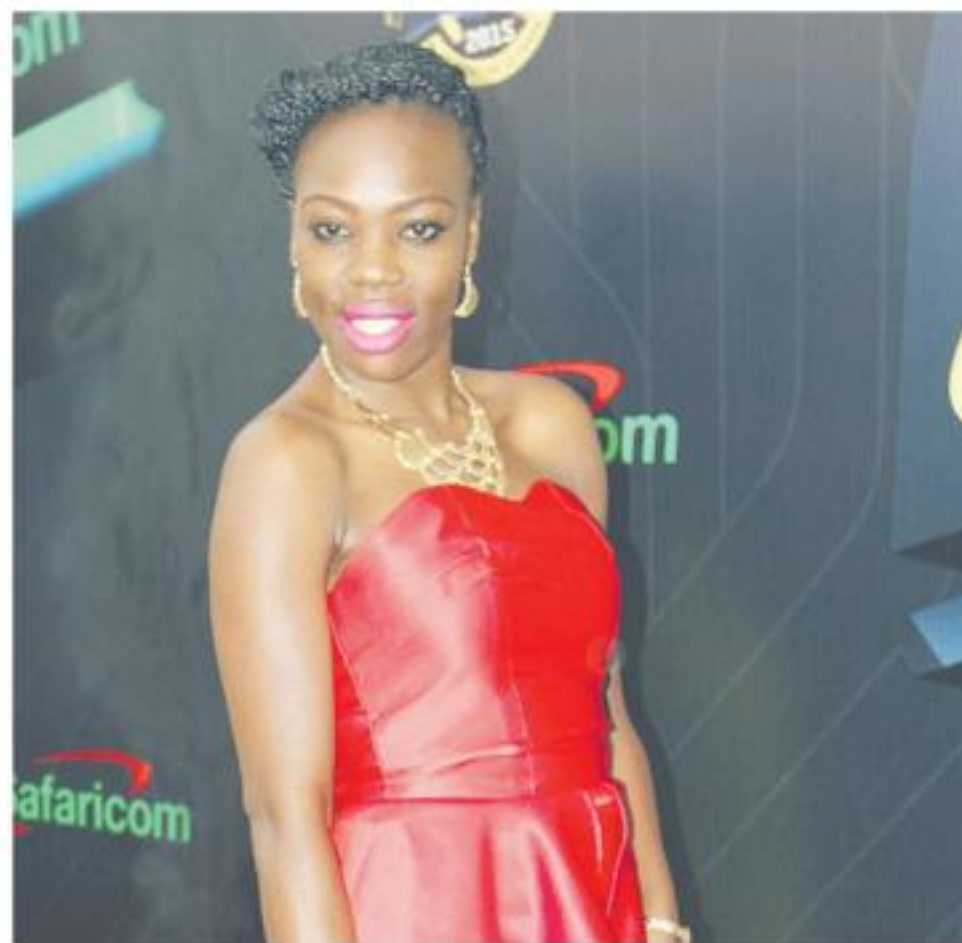

Gospel musician Ruth Matete's husband had severe body burns that caused his death, a post-mortem examination has showed.

Pathologists' report show that John Apewajoye, a Nigerian pastor, had 60 per cent burns that triggered a condition called sepsis leading to multiple organ failure.

Sepsis is a life-threatening condition caused by the body's response to an infection. The body normally releases chemicals into the bloodstream to fight an infection. Sepsis occurs when the body's response to these chemicals is out of balance, triggering changes that can damage multiple organ systems.

Chief Government pathologist Johansen Oduor said the burns made it impossible for him to recover. There were no other injuries detected on the body,



he added.

Detectives handling the case will now determine how to progress with the probe. Already, Ms Matete

has been questioned twice over her husband's death.

The detectives also went to Ms Matete's residential home in Athi River, Machakos County, to collect more

evidence to help them establish events that preceded Apewajoye's death.

The probe is being handled by detectives from the homicide unit. They took

over from their Athi River colleagues. The team reconstructed the scene of the incident as told by Matete.


She was asked to narrate events that led to the gas cylinder accident earlier reported as the cause of her husband's death.

Apewajoye died in hospital after the gas explosion incident in the couple's house at Great Wall Gardens Estate in Athi River.


Matete said Apewajoye was initially taken to Shalom Hospital and later transferred to Bellevue South Hospital in Nairobi, where he was admitted to the High Dependency Unit before being moved to Kenyatta National Hospital. He succumbed to his injuries there.

Matete, who is two months pregnant and the 2012 Tusker Project Fame star, told police her husband died two weeks after he suffered burn wounds.


Officials from the Energy and Petroleum Regulatory Authority are helping police to know if the cylinder was faulty at the time of the incident. They are also working with the company that supplied the cylinder to the couple as part of the investigation.

Locals feel the pinch of order to wear mask

Police inspect vehicles and patrol estates to nab locals flouting guidelines to curb coronavirus

For Sam Koech (not his real name), the turn of events on March 20 will remain etched in his mind forever.

He is among more than 200 people who were placed under 14-day quarantine at Kaplelach High School in Uasin Gishu County after they allegedly flouted government guidelines to curb the spread of coronavirus.

Koech, an accountant with a local milk outlet in Eldoret, narrated yesterday how together with his wife they woke up looking forward to a good day, but which ended on a bad note.

"We had decided with my wife, who is not employed, to find a place where we can set up a business to supplement our family income. We boarded a matatu to Kimumu shopping centre to look for a shop to rent for my wife to start a business," he recalls.

On the way back to Eldoret town at around noon, members of Nyumba Kumi and police officers manning a roadblock at Hawaii shopping centre flagged down the matatu they had boarded.

"We were not worried since we had our masks, but we

were asked to step out of the vehicle and questioned why our masks were not in place," he says on phone.

Their pleas fell on deaf ears as they were ordered to board a police van and their phones confiscated before they were driven to Moiben Police Station. Police told them they would undergo test for Covid-19.

Health is compromised

"After being held in the cells for more than three hours, other people were brought in and we were asked to board a police van and driven to Kaplelach High School. We were asked to inform our families to bring us clothes and bedding as we would be quarantined for 14 days for not wearing our masks properly," he narrates, adding that they were given back their phones.

Koech claims that 70 people were put in one dormitory whose sanitation was in poor state.

Koech's wife, who is expectant, has been forced to give up the comfort of their home. For

breakfast, they are served white porridge while for lunch and dinner, they eat ugali with green grams.

The facility is now home to those found holding house parties, defying curfew, illicit brewers, among other law breakers.

"On the first day four of us shared a bed and we had no masks. We feel our health is compromised at this facility more than ever and nobody seems bothered. Now that we are being held together with

my wife, we fear for the safety of our children," he says.

Another victim, June Jemutai (not her real name), is yet to come to terms with her circumstances.

"I had stepped outside my house at Rock Centre estate to buy painkillers for my three-year-old baby and on my way back from the chemist, I was arrested for not wearing a mask and taken to Kaptich Police Station," she recalls.

Hopes of being granted police bond were shattered after she was told to board a police vehicle headed to the quarantine facility.

"We are calling for justice, especially now that nobody has taken our samples for testing," she says.

But in a statement, Uasin Gishu Covid-19 emergency response team explains that the group flouted Covid-19 precautionary measures.

"They were detained because they ignored government directives. Anybody found drinking alcohol and gambling in dens or moving around during curfew hours is considered a coronavirus risk case. This is why you shall be put under 14-day quarantine while you are being taken through the court process," says Uasin Gishu Health executive Evelyne Rotich.

Area County Commissioner Abdiasak Jaldessa visited the quarantine centre and urged the group to observe social distance and sanitation rules.

Family escapes death after attack over land dispute

A family in Aldai, Nandi County, is living in fear after unknown people attacked and destroyed their home over a land dispute.

Samuel Rotich, a resident of Kiprotgorik village, said the Saturday night incident almost claimed the lives of his wife and six children.

"We were awakened by a bang on the roof a few minutes past 11pm. I went out to check but the gang continued throwing stones," Rotich said. "In the darkness, I told my wife to move out with the children to safety."

After realising the family had escaped, the gang broke into the house and destroyed their belongings as they hid under the cover of darkness.

What remained, according to Rotich, was broken plastic seats, scattered pieces of utensils and iron sheets cut to pieces.

Emily Jepkoech, Mr Leting's wife, recounted that a heavy stone fell through the iron sheet roof and almost hit her baby.

"Despite our calls for help none of the neighbours came to our rescue. We managed to escape and spend the night a kilometre away from home," she narrated.

According to the family, the incident could have been sparked by a prolonged land dispute between Stephen Maru and eight other people who are claiming ownership of the land.

For more than 20 years, Rotich has been a caretaker of the disputed land.

Kipkorir Kosgei, who claims to be a beneficiary of the land, said they were angered by a move to involve police officers from Kabu-choi to flash them out from the disputed parcel of land.

"The land is owned by the community and we as the sons demand our rights and justice," he said.

But Mr Maru dismissed the claims, saying he bought 22.6 hectares of land in 1975 from the late Kiptabut Kios, claiming that the sons of the deceased attacked Rotich in a bid to take over the land.

"The people encroached into the land and cultivated and upon seeking police intervention to stop the activities, they sought revenge by evicting the caretaker," stated Maru.

According to Aldai Sub-county police boss John Owuoth, Maru reported the invasion of his land to the police.

"Police evicted the people who were conducting agricultural activities in the disputed land," said Mr Owuoth. [Edward Kosut]

Chinese firm blamed for vandalising barrier

At least 2,000 residents of Namanjalala location in Kwanza constituency are up in arms against a construction company, which they blame for worsening flooding in the area.

The company, which is laying bitumen on the Lessos-Mailu Kumi na Moja road, has been accused of demolishing flooding barriers along Sabwani River bridge stretch.

As a result of the flooding, some residents have been displaced and crops swept away at Sabwani, Maliki, Marinda, Kobos and Buyanzi villages following a heavy downpour.

Several homesteads in the areas have been submerged and some of the displaced residents are now in need of relief aid.

"We want the construction company to be held liable for these floods since it demolished the barriers which contained

flooding around the area. They have to compensate us," said a resident, John Wekesa.

Area MCA Bernard Wanjala accused the management of the company of overlooking a directive by Devolution Cabinet Secretary Eugene Wamalwa to restore the barriers following a meeting last year.

Fix barriers

"I find the management of the company to be arrogant. They had agreed to fix the barriers last year, but they have not done so and people are now counting losses," he said.

They also called on the government to live up to its word of finding a lasting solution to the perennial floods in the region, which leave them counting losses any time it rains heavily. [Osinde Obare]

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Leadership

Elachi yet to ratify Jubilee's new list of officials

Jubilee Party leadership changes at the Nairobi County Assembly are yet to be effected, it has now emerged.

A push and pull has ensued between County Assembly Speaker Beatrice Elachi and the newly appointed leadership over the procedure used by Jubilee Party Secretary General Raphael Tuju in communicating the changes.

Last week, the party in a bid to end wrangles at the City's assembly, announced fresh leadership changes. It reinstated Matopani Ward MCA Abdi Guyo as the Assembly Majority Leader, replacing Dandora phase two MCA Charles Thuo. Guyo had been ousted in November 2019 following his fall out with the Speaker and Governor Mike Sonko. However, Elachi has since returned to the assembly following her impeachment.

Dandora MCA Peter Wanyoike was appointed as the Deputy Majority Leader taking over from Ziwani MCA Millicent Mugadi. Mihingo Ward MCA Paul Kados was further appointed as the new Majority party Chief Whip, replacing nominated MCA June Ndegwa, who held the position since November last year.

South B Ward legislator Waithera Chege was appointed as Deputy Majority Chief Whip. She replaces California Ward MCA Hassan Abdikadir. The party also picked Maringo/Hamza MCA Mark Ndung'u to serve on the Nairobi County Assembly Public Service Board.

Elachi, however, claims Mr Tuju has not served her office with a letter confirming the changes.

"Letters addressed to me have to be tabled on the floor of the House. Remember when Ngara MCA was the Acting Speaker he set a precedence on Elias Otieno. The first leadership only had a verbal communication," said Elachi, while responding to the notification by Mr Kados. [Josaphat Thiong'o]

Student who identified gang leader shot dead in night raid

He reportedly called one of the suspects by name prompting anger and shooting after 7pm on Wednesday.

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A university student was shot dead by a gunman he reportedly identified during a robbery in a hospital in Umoja, Nairobi.

Mr Rodgers Opiyo, a final year Accounting student at Meru University, was shot in the neck and died on the spot at the Phadum Medicare Hospital at about 7.30pm on Wednesday.

Opiyo, 22, had gone to buy medicine for his ailing aunt when the two thugs armed with pistols struck.

The doctor on duty told police the gang came in posing as clients at the reception and their main pharmacy. They then ordered them - the doctor, guards, receptionists and two other patients - to lie down and surrender all their valuables and cash.

Opiyo glanced up, called out one of the robbers by name and questioned why they were stealing from him. With-

in seconds, the gunman pulled the trigger and shot him at close range before escaping with their loot.

Police arrived at the scene moments later, but found the robbers had escaped. Buru Buru police boss Adamson Bungei said they were following vital clues.

"There will be justice to this incident. Efforts to get the gang is ongoing," he said.

Bungei said the student had gone to the hospital chemist to buy medicine. "He called one of the suspects by his name, prompting anger and the shooting. This happened as they were robbing those on the floor," said Bungei.

Fateful day

Opiyo's cousin Michael Otieno said the student's mother died when he was young. He grew up in Umoja where his aunt (his mother's sister) took care of him. He had been in Umoja since college closed last month in the wake of Covid-19 pandemic.

On the fateful day, Opiyo had been with his aunt in the house when she asked him to go and get her the medication.

"His dad lives in Kilifi with his other

siblings and they received the news of the death long after it had happened. We do not know what to do next, but we demand justice," he said.

"Opiyo had planned to travel to Kilifi but could not because of the partial lock-down," said Otieno.

Elsewhere, a man was shot and robbed of Sh350,000. The victim was

taking the money to a bank in Kariobangi, Nairobi, when he was confronted by two men on a motorcycle.

Witnesses and police said the man resisted an order to surrender the cash prompting the gang to shoot him in the stomach. The gang grabbed the cash and sped off. A hunt was launched for them in vain. The victim was rushed to hospital where he is admitted in stable condition.

Meanwhile, two people were on Tuesday electrocuted in two separate incidents in Nairobi. One died as he repaired metal doors in a house in Ruaraka area, Nairobi. Police said the welder was on duty when he was electrocuted. The incident sparked fire, which was promptly contained. Police said they are investigating the incident to establish how it happened.

Nairobi police boss Philip Ndolo said a team of experts is investigating the incident.

The second incident happened in Kariobangi where a water heater killed a woman. The woman is said to have been heating water in her house when the heater exploded. Ndolo said they were called and informed of the incident minutes after it had happened.

Appointments

County hires new members to head recruitment

The Homa Bay County government has recruited three members to the County Public Service Board as it seeks to hire more staff to bolster service delivery.

The move is expected to end the controversies that dogged the hiring of 120

health workers in the wake of the Covid-19 fight. An attempt to hire the workers had stalled over delays in having in place a complete board.

The new members are Elijah Kodo, Sarah Nekesa and Lawrence K'Oteng. On

Wednesday, Homa Bay Senior Principal Magistrate Thomas Obutu inaugurated the new members.

Governor Cyprian Awiti, who also participated in the ceremony, appointed Kodo to serve as the board chair-

man in an interim capacity.

Awiti challenged the new members to address integrity issues that had dogged the previous board. He said a number of questions had been raised on the manner in which the previous board members conducted them-

selves, especially on recruitments.

Awiti termed bribery claims during recruitment as a serious issue. "I want the new board members to embrace integrity in service delivery. Let them restore the image of the board,"

Awiti said.

The county public service board has not been operational since the county assembly passed a motion instructing Awiti to fire three members who were serving in the board. [James Omoro]

Woman, child killed in dawn attack at Ol Jororok village

Shock has gripped Chakareli village in Ol Jororok after unknown assailants raided it killing a woman and her five-year-old daughter. Another daughter and a niece, to the deceased, escaped with injuries and are admitted to Nyahururu County Referral Hospital.

Ol Jororok sub-county police commander Isaac Ruto said the four were sleeping in the same house when they

were attacked at around 5am on Thursday. The assailants attacked their victims using crude weapons after gaining access to the house by digging a hole on the wall.

Police officers on patrol heard screams from the house and responded.

"Our officers were enforcing the curfew in the morning when they heard screams from the home. They moved in only to find the four injured with a hole dug leading to

their house," said Ruto.

Ruto said the woman, aged 30, together with her daughter, died while receiving treatment at the Nyahururu hospital.

"The other two have been admitted with head injuries. They are in critical condition," added Ruto.

The motive of the attackers has not been established, but police are pursuing the deceased woman's husband. The two

separated last month.

"It is a theory we are following. We do not know why the family separated. They have been living at their grandmother's house," police said.

Two weeks ago, another woman was killed in the same village. The attackers dug a hole on her house's wall to gain entry. [James Munyeki]

Machakos. Needy families receive goodies

■ About 100 families yesterday received food donations and coronavirus protective gear from a well-wisher. The vulnerable families were each reached at their homes in Lower Klandani sub-location, Mumbuni, in Machakos town Sub-county. Peter Kioko, also the Kanu secretary Machakos County, was assisted by local chief Richard Nzioki to reach the families. Each member of the families got a mask, sanitiser and assorted foodstuff which makes a package for three days. "I call upon other well wishers to come out and assist our people instead of leaving the whole burden to the national and county governments," said Kioko, who also trained the beneficiaries on how to use the protective gear. Kajiado. 200,000 face severe food shortage



■ At least 200,000 people risk starving to death in the county's rural areas. The situation has been worsened by the Covid-19 pandemic. Factory's dilemma as mudslide ruins farms

The factory had just gotten approvals by Keps to start producing mango juice.

A Sh100 million mango processing factory established recently in Kerio Valley is facing difficulties even before sending its first products to the market.

The factory, established by the Kerio Valley Development Authority (KVDA) two years ago, has been seriously affected after farms supplying it with fruits for processing were carried away by a recent mudslide that hit the region.

The factory had just gotten approvals by the Kenya Bureau of Standards, with the first product expected in the market in September this year.

Kaben, Sambalat and Chesegeon areas, which were never hit, were the leading source of the mangoes being processed at the factory.

Trail of destruction

While most of the farms were swept away, some were submerged leaving a trail of destruction.

Julius Tolimo, a mango farmer in Chesegeon, said his three-acre farm with about 150 trees was submerged.

"I was expecting my first harvest later this year; this was my only hope as I had switched from pastoralism to farming. My farm is no more and all I have been left with are rocks and mud that came down from the escarpment," said Tolimo.

He said his dilemma now was moving the rocks from his farm.

"My wish is to start all over again but as at now there is nothing much I can

do and my prayer is for the government to step in and help us get back our farms," he added.

John Kimutai, another farmer, is also counting losses as his farm wasn't spared either. It is estimated that over 100,000 mango trees could have been destroyed by the mudslide.

"We are living in fear since the heavy rains are still ongoing. Some of us have already been hit so hard as we had so much expectations on the factory, which was ready and willing to buy our fruits," lamented Kimutai.

KVDA Managing Director Sammy Naporos said the factory has a capacity to process 30 tonnes of mangoes daily.

"Sambalat and Chesegeon areas were our biggest suppliers which leaves us at a disadvantage. It will take a while for farmers to get their farms back in order but we

will continue supporting them. Right now we are in the process of supplying them with grafted mango seedlings," said Mr Naporos.

He said the authority was assessing the damage to establish the exact number of mango trees destroyed by the mudslides.

Agriculture Chief Administrative Secretary Linah Kilimo said the government will look into land usage in

the area and advise farmers to avoid being caught up in such disasters in future.

"A comprehensive geological report that will inform land usage along the hanging valley is needed. The government will make difficult decisions and I urge residents to support these," Kilimo said.

Arid and Semi-Arid Lands Principal Secretary Micah Powon said the national government will work closely with KVDA to grow commercial bamboo and mangoes along the landslide prone escarpments.

The factory was a reprieve for mango producers, who have been incurring heavy losses due to poor marketing strategies aggravated by poor road network linking Endo, Sambirir, Aror and Soy producing zones and market centres.

Environment

Nowhere to dump tonnes of garbage

Nyeri town is running out of options after yet another ward rep blocked an attempt to dump waste in his locality.

The county government has been facing a garbage disposal crisis since last year when Nyeri town's dumpsite was decommissioned and later closed to pave way for a new bus park.

According to county government records, the decommissioned dumpsite used to receive at least 150 tonnes of garbage every day.

The county began transporting garbage to Gikeu dumpsite in Karima ward, Othaya constituency. However, residents protested and blocked garbage trucks from dumping at the site.

Similar protests erupted at Mweiga dumpsite where area ward rep, Njuguna Kawanjiku, joined residents to confront county workers dumping garbage at the site.

Third protest

Yesterday, Konyu ward rep Eric Wamumbi confronted county officials at the Karindundu dumpsite, Mathira constituency, where garbage from Karatina, Nyeri Town, Tetu and Mukurweini constituencies is ferried every day.

The ward rep protested increased dumping of garbage at the site without proper management.

"The Karindundu dumpsite is located in a residential area, and lately the county has been dumping garbage from all over Nyeri County there; residents are complaining and it is my job to represent their concerns," said Wamumbi.

"Before they closed the Nyeri town dumpsite, Karindundu used to have only two trucks of garbage per day, now there are at least 10 trucks ferrying garbage into my ward. This must be stopped," he said.

Mr Wamumbi was later summoned to Karatina Police Station where he recorded a statement on the protest.

Mathira MP Rigathi Gachagua waded into the controversy, saying he would oppose any plan by the county to have Nyeri town's garbage dumped in his constituency.

"We shall not have garbage dumped anywhere in Mathira. The dumpsite is in a residential area and is a health hazard," Mr Gachagua stated.

He promised to convene a leaders meeting after the coronavirus pandemic to address the issue, which he described as "a provocation".

However, sanitation executive Beth Karimi said she had all the necessary approvals to use the Karindundu dumpsite, and that the four acres on which it stands belong to the county. [Lydia Nyawira]

He explains that Islam teaches that every Ibaadat (worship) performed under hardship attracts better reward than during the time of ease.

"This is the time to exercise patience which is a great virtue and perform our Ramadhan in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the prophet which fall within the government framework of directives to safeguard the community during these difficult times," he said.

According to the cleric who is a renown Muslim scholar, none of the practices observed during Ramadhan will be necessarily altered by directives issued to combat the contagion wreaking havoc in the world.

"The Prophet observed Taraaweesh (the Sunnah night worship) at home with his wives, it was Khalifa Umar who made

it a congregational prayer during his reign. Therefore, all we have to do is replace the sunna (tradition) of Khalifa Umar with that of the prophet and pray taraweesh at home with the rest of the family," said Sheikh

Other clerics concur that this year's Ramadhan will offer faithful new opportunities which will have overall benefits on their fasting experience.

"This is a time when Muslims should be objective as there are many benefits to reap during this years Ramadhan which we have been totally missing out from in the past," says Sheikh Muhdhar Khitami SUPKEM Coast Chairman.

The cleric said that Ramadhan is the month the Quran was revealed and intensive recitation of the Quran during Ramadhan should be observed. According to the Sheikh, there is great opportunity for recitation during this stay-at-home period.

"We have the family coming together strengthening relationships as well as ensuring that the dad spends time with his children, which in the past was being neglected under the guise of loitering to while away the time as people awaited the announcement for breaking the fast in the evening," he said.

"Those who strive to recite the entire Quran during the month of Ramadhan but are distracted by the hustle and bustle of life have no excuse this time. The lockdown offers ample time," he said.

Sheikh Muhdhar observes that we are being forced by circumstances to observe the fundamentals companions of the holy Prophet willingly adhered to.

"Our Ramadhan used to be accompanied by so much unnecessary ceremony that did little to add value to our piety all of which the new regulations do not allow. We should therefore have a better fasting experience," he noted.

He says that the prophet used to break the fast with one date and a sip of water before observing Maghrib prayer which is different from the array of food Muslims prepare just for breaking the fast before the main meal.

"The Corona restrictions have therefore ensured that we cut down on israaf (wastage) and overspending even as those who wish to donate to the less fortunate still have many avenues to deliver on their ssadaqat," he said.

CIPK Organizing Secretary Sheikh Muhammed Khalifa says that in Islam all actions are based on their intentions, according to the famous hadith by the prophet. "Those who wish to fast will fast despite the restrictions in place," he says.

According to the Sheikh, the times for fasting, breaking the fast, obligatory practices during fasting and the intention for fasting remains the same. "Nothing changes," he insists.

"The congregational prayer that Muslims observed at the mosque can still be achieved at home with the family praying together, taraaweesh initially was observed at home by the prophet, those willing to donate to the poor can use mobile money transfer and the many avenues available to give charity. It would even be advisable to seize the opportunity and intensify ibaadat (worship)," he said.

With the Islamic holy month commencing, many have raised concern over the curfew that has seen closure of mosques at a time when muslims traditionally attend the five daily prayers in large numbers.

The special taraweesh night prayer that is observed only in the month of Ramadhan is usually the highlight of the holy month.

Sheikh Khalifa noted that Corona should serve as a wakeup call to Muslims, so that they streamline all their activities as the religion values life.

How do we make this Ramadhan which will be observed under unfamiliar regulations count?

We should thank Allah for the mercy of being able to observe our Ramadhan despite the Corona pandemic.

The fact that mosques have been shut down doesn't necessarily mean that prayers are closed. The fact that we cannot share congregational iftar (Evening meal) doesn't mean that sadaqat (Charity) during this holy month has been suspended. The fact that we are to observe the fast staying home doesn't mean that we cannot earn rewards for the month.

What we need to do is to focus our faith in Allah and stay positive believing that the negativity we may have developed regarding the disease does not hinder our motivation to reap Ramadhan benefits.

We may be gearing up for a different Ramadhan with limited opportunities amidst the hardship, there is a different aspect of the holy

month with a raft of brand new benefits that we are going to experience.

Obvious blessings during this stay-at-home period is that the family will be together, bonding, helping around the house and generally sharing the experience.

"What we need to do is to focus our faith in Allah and stay positive."

The congregation for ibadat (worship) like the daily salawat (prayer) and taraweesh (additional night prayer during Ramadhan) will consist of only the family unit of one household which according to Ulama (Scholars) is acceptable.

Of course time to recite and even complete the Quran will not be interfered with, and last but not least, the darsa (religious education lectures) we used to attend at the mosque will

Welcome and have a blessed 2020 Ramadhan

The leadership of the Supreme Council of Kenya Muslims (SUPKEM) congratulates the Muslim community and the rest of our beloved countrymen and women on the commencement of the holy month of Ramadhan 2020.

We reiterate that the holy Month of Ramadhan is an important pillar in the Islamic faith since it is a period that is designed to inculcate in Muslims the values of discipline, devotion and humility. We particularly recognize the importance of this season to members of the Muslim community as it is a month during which they strengthen their journey of devotion and reflection.

Let us remind ourselves of the following teachings of the Holy Quran on Ramadhan;

1. *"The month of Ramadan is the month in which the Qur'an has been sent down as guidance for mankind containing clear signs which lead to the straight road and distinguishing the truth from falsehood." (2:185)*
2. *Fasting is prescribed for you as it was prescribed for those before you, that you may attain piety." (Holy Quran 2:183).*

Apart from the cited Quranic teachings, the Holy Prophet Muhammad (saw) said, "When the month of Ramadhan starts, the gates of Heaven are opened and the gates of Hell are closed and the devils are chained." (Imam Bukhari).

Further, the Messenger of Allah said: "...whoever fasts during Ramadhan out of sincere faith and hoping to attain Allah's rewards, then all his past sins will be forgiven." (Imam Bukhari).

In view of the foregoing clear teachings, the Supreme Council wishes all Muslims a blessed Ramadhan 2020 and calls upon the non-Muslim brethren to accord their Muslim brothers and sisters any support they may stand in need of in order to fulfill this important article of faith.

However, this Ramadhan comes at a unique time when there is a deadly and devastating worldwide pandemic in the form of coronavirus of the Covid-19 strain. This pandemic has affected virtually every country in the world and Muslims have not been spared its fatal consequences.

Just the other day, we in Kenya lost an Imam from Nairobi's Eastleigh area to Covid-19. We, therefore, don't need any other lesson for us to acknowledge that coronavirus is a reality and we must take all necessary measures to protect ourselves from it.

In this regard, the Government of Kenya, like other governments the world over, has put in place measures under the Public Health Act and the Public Order Act in order to manage and contain this pandemic. The measures include punitive, but necessary, orders prohibiting public gatherings, social distancing and imposing a night curfew accompanied by orders commanding people to maintain certain hygienic standards like washing hands with soap and putting on face masks while in public places.

SUPKEM acknowledges that some of the measures to contain Covid-19 are punitive in the sense that they inhibit the ability of Muslims to perform some of their religious obligations effectively and in the manner they are expected to perform them under normal circumstances.

Sofar, the anti-coronavirus measures have caused the suspension of all congregational prayers, leading to the closure of all worship places including Mosques. The 2020 Hajj to Mecca is in limbo given the advisory issued by the Saudi government on grounds that international travel is suspended and there is an anti-coronavirus lockdown in Saudi Arabia itself.

This means that the 2020 Ramadhan will not be business as usual for Muslims and all other people who are affected by it. In fact, the highest religious body in Saudi Arabia has issued a communiqué instructing Muslims to perform Ramadhan and Idd prayers at home during pendency of the coronavirus pandemic.

Since extraordinary situations call for extraordinary measures, we Muslims have no choice but to abide by the government regulations appertaining to Covid-19. In fact, there are plenty of lessons in Islamic teachings about such situations, so the Muslim community need not feel so much aggrieved.

Islamic rules over epidemics to protect people from death and sickness go back to the very early stages of the religion. On many occasions, the Prophet Muhammad advised his companions to value their lives as the

utmost importance over death in his numerous sayings (hadiths), urging people to stay away from places where there were epidemics.

"When you hear that a plague is in a land, do not go to it and if it occurs in a land that you are already in, then do not leave it, fleeing from it," the Holy Prophet famously said.

This saying exactly refers to the principle of modern quarantine. What is being currently practiced concerning the coronavirus outbreak is the same principle as the advice of the Prophet. Hence, as the Covid-19 outbreak continues to ravage tens of thousands of people across the world, the Holy Prophet's advice on how to respond to a pandemic offers a motivation to people to stay put in their homes and protect themselves from the deadly virus.

During the rule of Caliph Umar, who was one of the four righteous caliphs after the Prophet, Muslims also practiced what the Prophet urged them to do in the time of an epidemic.

When one of the Muslim armies approached a location in current Syria where there was a plague back in the mid 7th Century, the commanders fell into confusion over what to do. Caliph Umar urged the army commander to retreat from the expedition in the face of the plague.

But the order did not appear to be fulfilled wholeheartedly. Then, he personally moved to a location to meet with commanders to discuss the situation. When the disagreement continued, he consulted with a diverse range of advisers to reach an ultimate decision. Finally, he settled on the decision to stay away from the plague.

"I am returning in the morning, so return as well," Umar said, declaring his decision to retreat. Abu Ubaydah ibn Jarrah, the commander of the army and one of Umar's best friends, who passed away later from the plague, expressed his dislike of Umar's decision, asking: "Are you fleeing from the decree of Allah?"

"Yes, we are fleeing from the decree of Allah to the decree of Allah," Umar famously replied.

Above all, we as Muslims are enjoined to obey and respect authority. The Holy Quran says; "O ye who believe! Obey Allah, and obey the Messenger, and those charged with authority among you." (4:59).

Islamic scholars in their interpretations of this verse agree that the term of "Uli-al Amr" has general application and is not specific. According to mainstream interpretations, the meaning of Uli al-Amr includes incorporates various aspects of leadership that should be obeyed including military commanders, political leaders and the authority of the state in general.

The Supreme Council, therefore, calls upon the Muslim community to summon its energy, knowledge and wisdom to perform their religious duties during Ramadhan while upholding fidelity to the government measures to combat Covid-19.

We also pray that the Almighty lessens the burden of Covid-19 on humanity and enable us to resume our normal lives.

BENEFITS OF THE MONTH OF RAMADHAN

Ramadhan is a month of dignity, spirituality, awareness, giving, solidarity, justice, love and mercy. A month that Muslims anxiously await and prepare for and one of great nourishment for it really is a holy one.

Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) said:

GIVING IN CHARITY

The Prophet (PBUH) said, "He who gives food to a fasting person to break his fast, he will receive the same reward as him, without nothing being reduced from the fasting person's reward." (Tirmidhi)

Inspired by this Hadith, Muslims compete with one another in charitable activities during Ramadhan to win Allah's pleasure and reward. Nearly no Muslim sleeps hungry during this holy month, which shows the magnitude of how charitable people seek to become.

PATIENCE

Another important quality one develops during Ramadhan through fasting is patience. Allah has mentioned the word *sabr* or patience more than 70 times in the Qur'an and commanded patience in more than 16 ways in the holy book.

When one fasts from dawn to dusk, giving up food and drink and marital sexual relations for several hours, he/she learns restraint and patience.

CLOSENESS TO ALLAH

Allah says in the holy Qur'an:

"O you who believe, fasting has been prescribed upon those before you so that you may attain Taqwa or piety." (2: 183)

During this period, Muslims engage in prayers seeking the forgiveness of Allah, recite and reflect on the Qur'an during night and day and perform night prayers.

AVOIDING SINS

The prophet (peace be upon him) said, "Whoever does not abandon falsehood in word and action, then Allah has no need that he should leave his food and drink." (Bukhari)

If anything befalls you, do not say 'If only I had done (such and such), the such and such would have happened,' rather say: 'Allah has decreed and what He wills He does,' for 'if only' opens the door to the work of the shaitan." (Muslim, 2664).

Ibn al-Qayyim (may Allah have mercy on him) said: This Hadith includes several important principles of faith, including the following: "Do not feel helpless": Feeling helpless is contrary to striving for that which will benefit him, and it is contrary to seeking the help of Allah.

As mentioned in the Hadith above, a strong faith can help us to hold our heads high. When faith seems to be dwindling, we should get back to Quran and remind ourselves that only Allah can let us out of our ordeal and problems. Muslims rally to support govt efforts to tame COVID-19

The Islamic community has stepped forward in support of the government's efforts in the fight against the Covid-19 pandemic.

The initiative under the auspices of the National Muslim Covid-19 Response Committee has brought together Muslim Organizations and other stakeholders have embarked on various programmes aimed at containing the spread of the deadly disease.

The committee is chaired by Umma University vice chair Prof. Muhammad Karama and has members who include the Supreme Council of Kenya Muslims (SUPKEM), various mosques and organizations such as Kenya Association of Muslims Medical Practitioners (KAMMP), Muslim Counsellors and Psychiatrist Associations among others.

At the onset of the coronavirus pandemic, among the pressing concerns for the community was how to handle bodies of victims of Corona Virus.

Islamic tenets dictate that the deceased have to undergo certain rituals that include washing and shrouding which in the Covid-19 situation makes a very risky affair.

This being one among the many reasons that brought Muslims together to deliberate on how to handle the bodies in a manner which will be within the tenets of Islam while at the same time ensuring the safety of those handling the bodies.

Through the deliberations, the committee expanded its scope of work and formed committees which went beyond body handling and included janazah (burial), welfare and resource mobilization, home based care, and psycho-socio support.

"Islam has specific rituals for the deceased which include the ritual washing (ghusl) and shrouding before burial. This no doubt put those handling the body in a precarious situation and we had to sit and deliberate on

the best way to handle the matter in line with Islamic teachings," said Prof. Karama.

Through consultations with Islamic scholars, the committee developed guidelines for the handling of deceased Muslims who pass away as a result of Covid-19.

In normal circumstances, the body of the deceased is washed and shrouded after which a communal prayer is said over the deceased before burial.

Guidelines developed by the Committee have altered some of these procedures recommending for the bodies to be buried without being subjected to ghusl procedures.

He stressed that Islam places great emphasis on the protection of life affirming that the measures taken are aimed at preventing the spread of the disease.

In accordance with protocols from the Ministry of Health, the bodies will be wrapped in sheets and placed in body bags before being transported to the burial areas.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) based in the United States advised that the body of someone who has died from the coronavirus should not be touched, due to concerns about contracting and spreading the disease.

Over one hundred volunteers in various parts of the country have been trained in the handling of the dead and the proper use of Personnel Protective Equipment (PPE) which are essential for those who come in close contacts with Covid-19 positive cases.

The volunteers will provide assistance in the handling of the dead who succumb in hospitals. For home cases, the bereaved families are advised to report the death through the toll free number 719 for government assessment before the team engages in the burial procedures.

In addition, a team of psychiatrists and psychologists have been put in place to provide counseling and psycho-social support to the families of the deceased.

3. READ THE TRANSLATION

The Quran being more important than

any other book you will come across as a Muslim.

It doesn't mean that you should postpone getting an understanding of the Qur'an until you are able to master the Arabic language

4. REFLECT ON THE VERSES

In various places in the Qur'an, Allah admonishes us for not pondering over His verses and His signs. I assume you have ever read a set book in school and had to analyze the tiny nuances that made the book interesting.

If you were able to reflect on the set book, Qur'an is more worthy of your time. With the Qur'an, you could ask yourself important questions that might help you in your reflection process. For instance: *in what context or situation was this particular verse revealed? What names of Allah are mentioned at the end of the verse and how are they related to what is being said? How does the message in this verse relate to my current situation?*

In doing so, you are more likely to develop a deeper, personal connection with this

Book. When you recite the verses you reflected upon in your prayers you are probably going to have a better focus and more rewarding spiritual experience.

5. QUALITY OVER QUANTITY

It is common practice for Muslims to aim to finish reciting the Qur'an from cover to cover during this month. And it sometimes becomes a sort of competition as people rush over the pages heedlessly in order to finish before their peers.

I don't mean to belittle the act of reciting the whole Qur'an. All I'm asking is for us to pay more attention to what we are reciting.

It might take us more time to read the translation and reflect on the verses and we might end up covering less ground. But isn't this better than rote recitation where the words enter our ears but don't permeate our hearts?

May Allah make us sincere in our deeds and may He let us discover the secrets of the Qur'an. May this Ramadhan be your best yet!

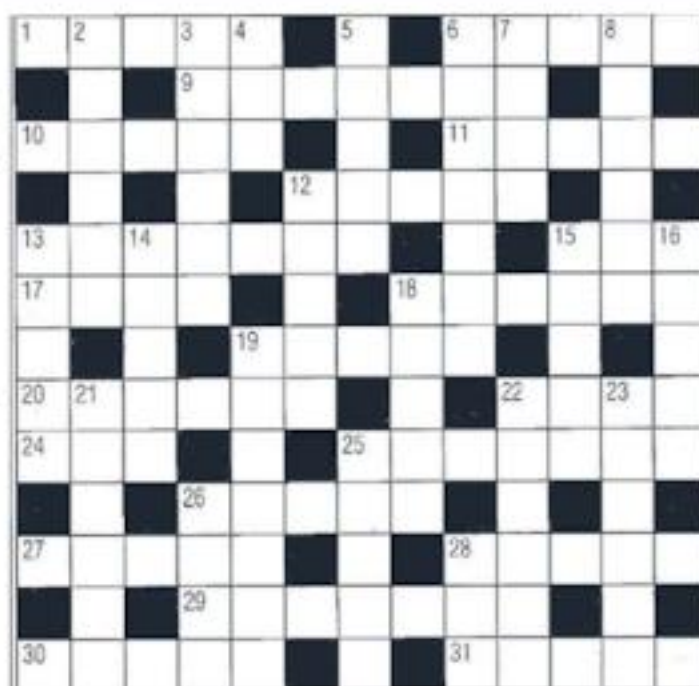

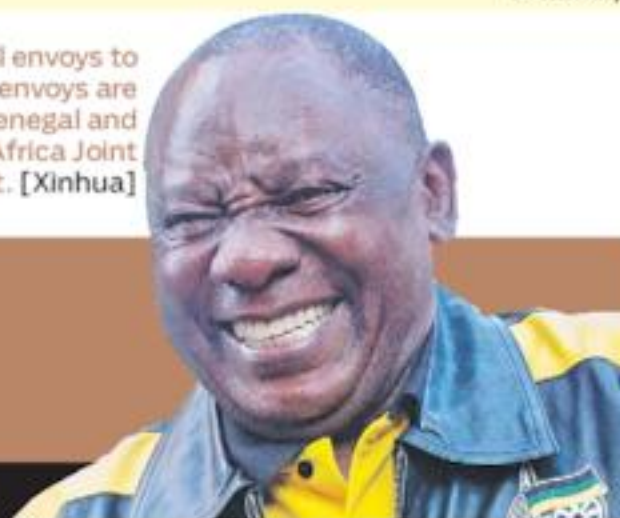

Moving past 'invisible enemy', Trump nudges nation to reopen

White House officials believe they've moved from crisis mode to sustained mitigation and management.

For weeks, the Trump administration played up the dangers of the coronavirus as it sought to convince Americans to disrupt their lives and stay home.

Now, as President Donald Trump aims for a swift nationwide reopening, he faces a new challenge: convincing people it's safe to come out and resume their normal lives.

It's a defining question for a cloistered nation — and a political imperative for Mr Trump, whose re-election likely rides on the pace of an economic rebound.

Can the country move beyond a crippling fear of the virus and return to some modified version of its old routines, doing what's possible to mitigate the risk of Covid-19, but acknowledging it may be a fact of life for years to come?

"We need to create the kind of confidence in America that makes it so that everybody

goes back to work," said Kevin Hassett, a White House adviser and former chair of the Council of Economic Advisers.

"And that confidence is going to require testing and confidence that your workplace is a healthy place, but also confidence in the economy."

At the White House, officials believe they've entered a new chapter of the pandemic response, moving from crisis mode to sustained mitigation and management.

It began last Thursday with the release of guidelines to governors for how to safely reopen their states. Trump and Vice President Mike Pence celebrated Americans for successfully "flattening the curve" of the epidemic.

A day later, a phalanx of the administration's top medical officials sought to reassure the nation that there were plenty of tests available to safely begin easing restrictions.

Governors have been lifting restrictions each day since then, including aggressive moves announced on Wednesday in Montana and Oklahoma.

The Montana governor gave schools the green light to open their doors in early May, and Oklahoma will allow salons,

barbershops, spas and pet groomers to reopen today.

Trump, in his evening press conference, did take issue with Republican Georgia Governor Brian Kemp's bold reopening plans. "I disagree strongly," he said. "I think it's too soon."

The governors' moves coincided with lingering bleak news around the country. The death toll in Massachusetts eclipsed 2,000 on Wednesday, doubling from just a week earlier. About 16,000 people remained hospitalised across New York.

A meat plant in Iowa that is vital to the nation's pork supply is the latest slaughterhouse to shut down because of outbreak. With the economy in for a long, brutal slump, Congress was on the verge of passing an almost \$500 billion (\$53.6 trillion) relief bill to bolster small businesses.

Italy

Traffic light for bathroom break is new normal

Simone Mela never dreamed that a traffic light would determine when he could take a bathroom break in the factory where he works. But in the world according to coronavirus, that is the new normal.

And he feels lucky to have a job. Only 200 of the 800 workers at the ISA company, which makes refrigerated display cases

for bars, restaurants and supermarkets, have so far been able to return to the factory in Italy's Umbria region.

The gradual return has been made possible through a combination of solutions ranging from simple to innovative to high tech.

Strips taped on the floor create walking lanes and

delineate work areas.

A yellow and green traffic light system was installed to keep the bathrooms safe. Workers flick a switch as they enter or leave the bathroom and the colour of the light tells those who want to enter if they can or have to wait.

The high-tech end of the company's back-to-work strategy is a system

known as SWAT, or System Workers Advance Tracing.

Employees scan an app onto their smartphones and clip a small white device on to their work clothes. It vibrates if they get too close to another worker and simultaneously sends a signal to a computer database.

"We are sure that it is

not a tool to spy on us. It is only a device to increase safety distances and to report close contacts," said Mr Mela. "If we find a positive case, it will be easier to trace the contacts they had. We feel very safe."

A similar system is on trial in the port of Antwerp.

ISA's managers realised

that if they wanted to stay in business, they had no choice but to modify work patterns and safety measures.

"To help people to cope with this virus, we developed a hardware and software system to help people work and adhere to social distancing," said ISA General Manager Marco Giulietti. [Reuters]

In Brief

Crisis. Zambia-Congo market still operating

Zambia's ministry of health is screening people travelling to Kasumbalesa, a one-stop border point with the Democratic Republic of Congo, to check symptoms of Covid-19. Three people have since died of the virus in Zambia. A spot check on the Zambian side found some traders wearing masks while others did not when conducting their businesses. Kasumbalesa Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa assistant officer Charles Maliwe said: "We have since embarked on a sensitisation programme to enforce President Edgar Lungu's directive to wear masks in public places." Kasumbalesa is one of the busiest trading facilities in Zambia. [Xinhua]

Coronavirus. Nigeria reports 91 new cases

Nigeria has recorded 91 new cases of coronavirus, bringing the country's total number to 873. The Nigerian Centre for Disease Control said 74 new cases were recorded in the commercial capital, Lagos, which remains the epicentre of transmission with more than 500 cases. The capital, Abuja, now has 119 cases while Kano state has 73 - the highest in northern Nigeria, where state governors have now banned Koranic schools to curb the spread of the virus. Nearly 200 people have been discharged so far in the country while 28 people have died of the disease. [BBC]

Somalia. Scribe arrested over links to Al-Shabaab

The Somali government on Wednesday confirmed the arrest of a journalist over possible links with the Al-Shabaab terror group. The ministry of information said in a statement that Mohamed Abdiwahab Abuja was being questioned by security forces in Mogadishu for having ties with the group. Abuja is a radio journalist who was arrested by Somali forces on February 27. The security forces said he was involved in a murder case committed on March 6, last year. The ministry said the security forces would charge the journalist with murder. [Xinhua]

Pandemic. Number of people living with acute hunger likely to rise to 265 million from 135 million last year

Covid-19: 5 countries most at risk from famine in 2020

After more than a quarter of a century of armed conflict, the DRC faces world's second-largest hunger crisis.

As deaths caused by coronavirus around the world continue to rise, the World Food Programme (WFP) has warned that the world faces a possible "hunger pandemic" as the number of people most in need of food could almost double this year.

At the end of 2019, 135 million people were living with "acute hunger". But with many countries around the world enforcing quarantine, that number is likely to rise to 265 million, the WFP says.

"Before the coronavirus even became an issue, I was saying that 2020 would be facing the worst humanitarian crisis since World War II for a number of reasons," WFP executive director David Beasley said on Tuesday.

The organisation, which received \$8.3 billion (\$890 billion) in 2019, now needs between \$10 billion-\$12 billion (\$1 trillion-\$1.2 trillion) to sustain its operations for this year.

So which countries are most at risk?

Yemen

Even before the war in Yemen began, the country was the poorest in the Arab world.

But since a Saudi-led coalition intervened in the conflict against Yemen's Houthi rebels in 2015, the country's humanitarian situation has deteriorated still further.

"As conflicts become longer, more and more people become vulnerable", the WFP's Chief Economist and Director of Research, Assessment and Monitoring Division, Arif Husain, told the BBC. "In 2016 in Yemen, we were maybe assisting three or four million people. Today that number is 12 million."

To make matters worse, the WFP said earlier this month it would halve aid to Houthi-controlled areas, over concerns voiced by some countries that the rebels were obstructing aid deliveries.

Yemen reported its first confirmed case of coronavirus earlier this month, with aid agencies warning that the disease could quickly overwhelm the country's weakened health systems.

Acutely food-insecure populations (million)

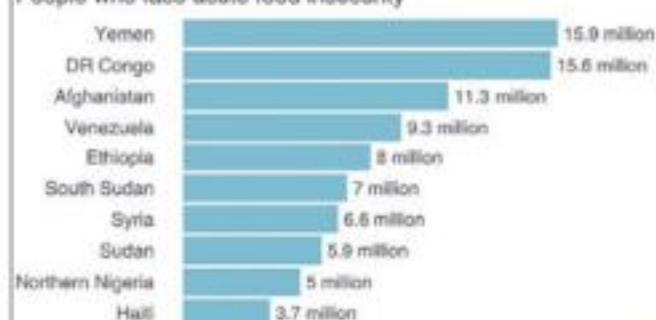

DR Congo

After more than a quarter of a century of armed conflict in parts of the country, the DRC is the world's second-largest hunger crisis, according to the WFP.

More than 15 per cent of the country's population are classed as "severely food insecure" - meaning that they are among 30 million people in war zones around the world who are almost completely dependent on aid. Almost \$2 billion (\$214.4 billion) is needed to secure the food supply for these populations in next three months alone, Mr Husain said.

"Those were the worst-affected people and now they're in even more trouble," he said. The DRC also has five million internally displaced people and over half a million refugees from neighbouring countries.

In addition to the heightened risk faced by anyone living in war zones, displaced

people are even more vulnerable during the coronavirus outbreak because they often lack basic hygiene facilities needed to help stop the spread of disease.

Earlier this month the spokesman for the UN's refugee agency, UNHCR, warned that ongoing violence in the DRC was threatening efforts to contain the spread of coronavirus there, which has so far mainly affected the capital Kinshasa.

Venezuela

Unlike the other countries on the list, Venezuela's hunger has not been caused by conflict or environmental factors, but rather by economic hardship.

Although Venezuela has the world's largest oil reserves, hyperinflation in the country reached 200 per cent in January last year, leaving a third of its people in need of assistance.

The difficulties have been compounded by a mass exodus

of health workers, according to WFP.

And the problems don't end there - around 4.8 million people (or 15 per cent of the population) have left Venezuela in recent years, and hundreds of thousands of these migrants are facing food insecurity in neighbouring countries.

South Sudan

The world's youngest country only gained independence from its northern neighbour, Sudan, in 2011. The move was meant to mark the end of a long-running civil war, but the country descended into violent conflict after just two years.

The WFP warns that hunger and malnutrition in South Sudan are at the most extreme levels since 2011, with almost 60 per cent of the population struggling to find food every day.

Making the situation worse, swarms of locusts which had destroyed crops across East Africa arrived in South Sudan earlier this year.

"If Covid-19 was not a story right now, desert locusts would be the biggest story," according to Husain.

And as one of the most oil-dependent countries in the world, the country is likely to be hit hard by falling oil prices.

The country has now recorded four cases of coronavirus, according to Johns Hopkins University.

Afghanistan

Another country ravaged by conflict, Afghanistan had suf-

fered almost two decades of war when the US invaded in 2001.

Eighteen years later, more than half of the population lives below the poverty line, and over 11 million people are classed as severely food insecure by the WFP.

According to Afghan government figures there have been over 1,000 confirmed cases of coronavirus.

While the numbers appear low, the country has limited access to testing and the health system has suffered under decades of conflict.

There are also fears that the virus could have spread after more than 150,000 Afghans returned from virus-stricken Iran in March, while tens of thousands of others returned from Pakistan.

The new 130 million

In addition to areas affected by war, environmental issues or economic crises, many more low- and middle-income countries are likely to be affected by job losses and other economic difficulties caused by the spread of coronavirus in the coming months.

The problem will be made worse by similar economic pressures in countries across the world, meaning that remittances, or money being sent back from relatives abroad, will fall in these countries.

"The most important thing is an affordable treatment which must be available to everyone across the world," Husain said.

Shilling holds steady. The shilling was stable against the dollar yesterday as market activity remained low due to the Covid-19 pandemic, traders said. In early trading, commercial banks quoted the shilling at 106.95/107.15 per dollar, the same as Wednesday's closing level. [Reuters]

Tullow: Virus could rain on Kenya's oil parade

Firm warns suspension of key works due to pandemic likely to derail scheduled transition to commercial production phase.

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The Coronavirus pandemic is likely to further delay Kenya's dream of starting commercial production of oil.

In its latest update to shareholders, the British-based company at the heart of oil production in Kenya has expressed doubt over the country's ability to complete the Final Investment Decision (FID) before the end of this year.

"In Kenya, a number of key work-streams have been suspended due to Covid-19 restrictions and while focus remains on the critical activities required for a Final Investment Decision (FID), Tullow will continue to monitor the impact these restrictions may have on the FID target," explained Tullow in a statement.

FID is a technical term for when the project execution phase begins and the big money starts being spent on its construction. With FID, Tullow can embark on large-scale production with the country officially joining the club of oil exporters. But this is now in doubt.

The country has been trucking 2,000 barrels of oil daily from the oil fields of Lokichar to the defunct refinery in Mombasa for export in what is meant to be a precursor to commercial production set for 2022. Even worse is the sharp decline in the price of oil in the global market,



with experts noting that at a price of below \$20 (Sh2,120) a barrel, Kenya's oil production is not viable.

Early this year, Tullow announced a restructuring of its operations after "disappointing exploration results in Guyana and production problems in Ghana", which led to the resignation of the company's chief executive and the exploration director in December.

The shake-up led to a bloodbath at its counter at the London Stock Exchange, with shareholders losing Sh180.6 billion in paper wealth in three months.

In Kenya, employees were put on the chopping board with the company eyeing a farmout - the assignment of part or all of an oil, natural gas or mineral interest to a third party for development.

Tullow Kenya Managing Director Martin Mbogo said the restructuring is group-wide and informed by Tullow's announce-

ment in December that its global oil production and associated revenues in 2020 and beyond would be lower than earlier projections.

"In Kenya, the team will be reduced and will only be focused on the critical path activities that will allow us to continue to target FID at the end of 2020," said Mr Mbogo. There are reports that the government has questioned Tullow's calculation of capital investment, which the firm estimates at around Sh250 billion.

This saw the Petroleum and Mining Ministry recently enlist the services of an audit company to help it ascertain Tullow's true investment.

"The objective will be to confirm the validity of the expenditures and the completeness of the revenue and production based on the terms of the agreement and the production sharing contracts of blocks 10BB and 13T," said the ministry.

Corona impact

Diaspora cash to dip by Sh47tr, says WB

Kenyans will receive less money from the diaspora this year as the coronavirus pandemic continues to hurt the global economy.

According to a new study by the World Bank, global remittances are projected to decline sharply by about 20 per cent this year due to the economic crisis induced by the virus.

The remittances to low and middle-income countries (LMICs) are projected to fall by 19.7 per cent to \$445 billion (Sh47.1 trillion), signalling a loss of a crucial financing lifeline for many vulnerable households.

Bank of Kenya (CBK).

This reflected a 3.7 per cent growth from 2018 when diaspora remittances stood at \$2.6 billion (Sh272.3 billion).

The projected drop in money from abroad has been compounded by the loss of wages as many workers in foreign countries have been laid off or put on unpaid leave, with many source countries imposing total lockdowns.

Majority of African migrants reside in the EU, the United States, the Middle East and China. These economies are a source of close to a quarter of total remittances sent to the region.

Last year, diaspora cash to Kenya came from North America, which accounted for the biggest share at 50 per cent, with Europe accounting for 20 per cent, while "the rest of the world" accounted for the remaining 30 per cent.

The World Bank study also found an increase in remittance cost, with the global average cost of sending \$200 remaining at a high of 6.8 per cent in the first quarter of 2020, with sub-Saharan Africa having the highest average cost of nine per cent.

"Quick actions that make it easier to send and receive remittances can provide much-needed support to the lives of migrants and their families. These include treating remittance services as essential and making them more accessible to migrants," said Dilip Ratha, lead author of the report.

But the sector is expected to improve by four per cent in 2021 if the pandemic doesn't spill over to the last quarter of the year. [Issack Mohammed]

Tech. Apple expands to new Africa markets

■ Apple Inc on Tuesday said it would expand its App Store, Apple Music and other services to dozens of new markets in Africa, the Middle East and beyond in the biggest geographical expansion of its services in almost a decade. Apple said it would expand the App Store to 20 countries, eight of them in Africa, and will offer its streaming Apple Music service in 52 additional countries and regions. The expansion is the largest

since Apple grew what was then called the iTunes Store to India, Russia and more than 50 other countries in 2012. Apple has focused on growing sales from its services segment, which totalled 17.8 per cent of its \$260.1 billion (Sh27.1 trillion) in revenue in its most recent fiscal year, as consumers have slowed in upgrading their smartphones. Apple executives said in January the company had an installed base of 1.5 billion active devices and aimed to reach 600 million subscribers to either its own or third-party services by the end of this year. Moratorium

Insurers offer relief on premiums

Insurance policyholders will enjoy a three-month grace period to help them cope with the effects of the coronavirus pandemic, the sector regulator has said.

The insurance regulatory authority (IRA) said the moratorium would apply for both contributions for insurance covers and renewal of premiums.

"Insurers should avail policyholders a three-month grace period. The grace period may be over and above any contractual premium holidays already in place for existing policies," said IRA Chief Executive Godfrey

Kiptum in a statement.

This comes a few weeks after industry players agreed to cover patients affected by the pandemic following consultations with the regulator.

The regulator warned insurers against introducing new product exclusions or changing terms of their product without informing them.

"Insurers should conduct and submit to the authority a stress and scenario testing, including updating of capital adequacy calculations and liquidity strains due to the effects of Covid-19," said Mr Kiptum.

Kenya has ten broad categories of general insurance.

These are motor, medical, fire, aviation, engineering, liability, marine, personal accident, theft and workman's compensation.

The sector has been grappling with rising claims that saw an underwriting loss of Sh2.97 billion in the last quarter of last year.

The moratorium is expected to further strain insurers who are expected to continue settling claims for which premiums have been paid even for motor and medical insurance, which are notorious for fraudulent claims. [Awal Mohammed]

Retailer loses out in Sh173m tax dispute

Court thwarts Choppies bid to have accounts unfrozen pending resolution of case with taxman.

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Choppies Enterprises Ltd, a retail chain with origins in Botswana, has lost its bid seeking to compel the taxman to unfreeze its accounts over a Sh173.4 million tax dispute.

Choppies, which has since exited the Kenyan market following a poor run, had moved to court seeking the order, pending resolution of the case.

However, High Court Judge David Majanja dismissed the application with costs to Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA).

KRA froze the accounts after it realised that the retail chain, which got a foothold in Kenya by acquiring Ukwala Supermarkets Ltd, was in the process of winding up its business in Kenya. The tax agency argued that the cash-strapped retailer had already sold its branches, assets and stocks to Tusker Mattresses Supermarkets, Chandarana Supermarkets, Quickmart Supermarkets and Appmatt Ltd without informing it despite the ongoing tax dispute.

"Choppies was faulted for not disclosing their financial position; they did not disclose how much was held in their accounts and what would be realised from the sale of their assets," said Paul Matuku, a commissioner in charge of legal services at KRA.

The court ruled that Choppies should provide security for taxes payable to KRA since it had closed shop in the country.

Further, the court gave the retailer and KRA 14 days to explore an amicable settlement of the tax dispute.

Nakumatt is another retail chain that went down with billions in unpaid taxes. Besides owing creditors, including landlords and suppliers as much as Sh40 billion, the erstwhile retail chain owes KRA about Sh2.3 billion.

With revenues declining due to the difficult economic environment, which has been compounded by the coronavirus

pandemic, KRA has resorted to enforcing compliance to optimise its collection.

Yesterday, the taxman also directed business owners trading on digital platforms to charge value-added tax (VAT) on their transactions and remit the taxes.

In a statement, the Commissioner for Domestic Taxes Elizabeth Meyo expressed concern that some digital business owners are not charging VAT as required by law.

"All non-compliant traders are hereby advised to comply to avoid penalties and interests on outstanding taxes failure to which appropriate action will be taken in accordance with the law. Where fraud will be detected, appropriate criminal proceedings shall be brought against the offenders," said Meyo. KRA is under pressure to aggressively collect taxes against a tough business environment, with the economy expected to suffer as a result of the coronavirus pandemic that has driven firms into bankruptcy.

McCullum says T20 World Cup could be moved to 2021

Former New Zealand captain Brendon McCullum thinks this year's Twenty20 World Cup is unlikely to go ahead as planned due to the COVID-19 pandemic and could be moved to early 2021 with the Indian Premier League (IPL) taking the October-November slot.

The outbreak of the novel coronavirus has brought sport to a standstill around the world and jeopardised T20 cricket's flagship tournament in Australia.

The IPL was scheduled to begin on March 29 but has been suspended indefinitely.

"As a punter, if I were to put my final dollar on what the schedule would look like, it would be that the T20 World Cup has got to be at risk," McCullum said on the Sky Cricket podcast.

"I can't see them playing the T20 World Cup behind closed doors either."

"There may be a window a bit later in the new year of 2021 which could then open up for the IPL."

McCullum said the IPL could be played behind closed doors as strong television numbers were guaranteed in cricket-mad India.

"The ICC and world cricket need crowds to operate but India can probably sustain things commercially behind closed doors because they are going to get so many eyeballs," said McCullum.

"The IPL will target that October window and the T20 World Cup will be pushed back," added the 38-year-old, now coach of the IPL's Kolkata Knight Riders. [Reuters]

Why men and women want to be joined into one body

Federer's idea for one "stronger body" received great response from top players.

WTA founder Billie Jean King and Rafael Nadal led a wave of support for Roger Federer's suggestion that "now is the time" to merge the men's and women's governing bodies, while tennis is at a standstill because of the coronavirus pandemic.

Federer, winner of a record 20 men's Grand Slam crowns, said a merger of the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) and the men's Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) "probably should have happened a long time ago" in a series of tweets.

The Swiss great's idea for one "stronger body" received an enthusiastic response from King, Nadal and leading women's players such as former Wimbledon champion Simona Halep, Petra Kvitová and Garbine Muguruza, but controversial Australian Nick Kyrgios expressed reservations.

ations.

"Just wondering... am I the only one thinking that now is the time for men's and women's tennis to be united and come together as one?" Federer posed to his 12.7 million Twitter followers.

Trailblazer King, who was instrumental in establishing the WTA in 1973, said such a merger "has long been my vision for tennis".

"I agree, and have been saying so since the early 1970s. One voice, women and men together... Let's make it happen," she tweeted.

Nadal, who has 19 Grand Slam titles, posted: "I completely agree that it would be great to get out of this world crisis with the union of men's and women's tennis in one only organisation."

Federer and Nadal argued that a merger could help tennis recover from the coronavirus shutdown.

which has seen Wimbledon cancelled for the first time since World War II and the French Open postponed from May to the end of September.

"It probably should have happened a long time ago, but maybe now is really the time," Federer wrote.

He said the current system was "too confusing for the fans when there are different ranking systems,

different logos, different websites, different tournament categories".

World number two and reigning Wimbledon champion Halep agreed, tweeting that Federer was "not the only one" thinking along those lines, while Muguruza added, "Yes, would be a good idea".

Two-time Wimbledon champion Kvitová tweeted: "Hands up if you agree with @rogerfederer," alongside a raised-hand emoji.

"These are tough times in every sport and we can come out of this with 2 weakened bodies or 1 stronger body."

Why Murunga can't forget 2018/19 season

Former national Sevens team tactician reveals how pleased he was after the squad retained its core status in World Series.

Kenya rugby fans will never forget the 2018/19 season. This was when the national Sevens rugby team survived relegation from the World Sevens Series by a whisker.

But if there was a man who was more relieved than anyone else then, it was former coach Paul 'Pau' Murunga.

Though Kenya had flirted with relegation in the recent past seasons, the Homeboyz RFC coach feels history would have judged him harshly if Shujaa had gone down during his tenure.

This was the toughest moment ever for Murunga in his coaching career.

Kenya has never been relegated since making its debut in the World Sevens Series in 1999. They became a core team in 2004.

Unlike the previous season where Kenya finished eighth on the overall table standings with a historic 104 points, the former Singapore champions had to wait until the final leg of the season in

Paris for them to retain their core status after their relegation rivals, Wales and Japan failed to go past the pool stages.

Kenya beat Wales 26-21 in the preliminary round tie and consequently qualified for the quarterfinals for the first time that season as Japan fell 22-21 to Scotland.

The feat saw Shujaa finish 13th on the log with 37 points, six ahead of Wales with Japan

relegated (27).

However, Shujaa's tribulations last season were self-inflicted as the disagreement between the Kenya Rugby Union and senior players over contractual issues coupled by poor preseason, nearly cost Kenya its core status.

The absence of second all-time top try scorers Collins Injera, Andrew Amonde, Nelson Oyoo, William Ambaka, Billy Odhiambo and Samuel Oliech was heavily felt as the team was involved in the relegation dogfight throughout the season.

And even as many criticised the union for setting up Murunga to fail, the tactician has come out to pay tribute to his youthful squad led by Johnstone Olindi, Vincent Onyala (KCB) and Daniel Taabu (Mwamba) for saving him blushes.

"Considering that most of the senior players had boycotted the call-

ups over contractual issues with the union, I had no option but to use the youngsters who were available," Murunga told *Standard Sports*.

"We were fighting for our lives. But I thank them because they stood with me and ensured we retain our status in the circuit despite all the challenges we faced. I can't imagine how people would be treating us, had we been relegated."

He added: "These youngsters were in a very tough situation because they had to play most of the matches without a proper pre-season and experience."

"Teams prepare for the Series in terms of pre-season and conditioning, something that we didn't do well."

"But the confidence they had even when some senior players thought we needed a backup in France to avoid relegation, lifted the team. Without players with such characters and fighting spirit, maybe we could have been relegated."

Despite the arrival of world cup-winning coach New Zealander coach Paul Feeney and the return of senior players this season, Shujaa have been blowing hot and cold.

Kenya is currently 12th on the table (35 points) with four legs to go.

Is this the year that will change the way we play golf?

In 1992, Queen Elizabeth II declared the year "annus horribilis", a Latin phrase meaning a horrible year.

This was after death by suicide of her nephew, a lot of bad publicity on members of the Royal Family as well as a fire in the Windsor Castle.

We are just into the second quarter of the year 2020 and as a result of all the suffering and death caused by the COVID-19 virus and the changes in the way we live, I am ready to use the phrase.

When the Kenyan government took the bold step to cancel all international events on Friday March 6, a week before the staging of the Magical Kenya Open, many may have seen it as an overreaction.

When the first case of a patient suffering from the dreaded virus, the very next week was announced, some number crunchers did some modelling and predicted that we would have thousands of cases in Kenya by the end of the first month.

By God's grace and as a result of the quick action taken by the Ministry of Health, we are nowhere near what had been predicted.

Two weeks ago, the USGA announced that the US Open, that was initially scheduled to take place between June 18-21, will now be played from September 17-20. A week later, the Ryder Cup is scheduled to be held.

The only downside to playing these tournaments this year is that they will be played without spectators. World number one golfer, Rory McIlroy, is not all too pleased about playing without spectators.

"A Ryder Cup without fans, it's not a Ryder Cup" he said.

If it were up to McIlroy and some of the other players, it would probably be better if the tournament was played in 2021, if that would guarantee the presence of spectators.

I, however, wonder if it is asking for too much for things to return to normal after just one year. Will we see the same kind of crowds for the Ryder Cup or any other golf tournament after one year?

I am not a behavioural

expert and I cannot claim to know how people will react but after going through the lockdowns and after getting used to social distancing, we are bound to continue avoiding crowded areas for a long time to come.

I personally would prefer to watch it on TV with a few friends; unless of course I am invited to referee.

The PGA European Tour are looking to return to action with the British Masters that is scheduled for July 30 to August 2. The US PGA Championship is set for the week after, August 6-9.

Would we be able to pull off the Magical Kenya Open 2020 from August 13-16? If this were to happen, it would probably be the best indication of a return to normalcy; whatever it will be after the dreaded COVID-19 is eventually put under control.

There is absolutely no way this year can be described in any other way other than annus horribilis, but should we be able to host the Magical Kenya Open in August, it will be the best way to start going back to normal in as far as golf is concerned.

With live TV coverage in millions of homes all over the world, it will also be the best way to showcase the opening up of Kenya after months of closure.

Even with the experts warning us that we are not out of the woods yet, I am choosing to focus on our world post the COVID-19 pandemic.

A Magical Kenya Open, with or without spectators, as long as it is televised live, will take some of the sting out of what has otherwise been a scene from a nightmare.

Murray to play in French Open, if it's held

Andy Murray has said that he would "definitely" play in the rescheduled French Open in September, if it is able to take place as planned.

The tennis season has been shut down due to the coronavirus pandemic since last month and will not resume until mid-July at the earliest.

Wimbledon has been cancelled and Roland Garros organisers controversially moved the French Open until September 20-October 4, start-

ing just a week after the end of the US Open, from its usual start date in May.

"I'd definitely play on the day, if it goes ahead," former world number one Murray told CNN.

"I'm a bit sceptical whether it will. I would imagine tennis would be one of the last sports to

get back to normality because you've obviously got players, coaches and teams coming from all over the world into one area."

"I'd be surprised if they're back playing sport by September time, but we'll see."

Murray had been due to return from a hip injury at the



Miami Open last month.

The 32-year-old Scot had considered retiring before surgery allowed him to make an initial comeback from injury last year, winning his first ATP title since 2017 in Antwerp last October.

"I was training to get ready for that and that was going to be a good test. I was fit and feeling pretty strong," Murray, currently ranked 129th in the world, said.

Kenyans mourn former Commonwealth Games bronze medallist Maina

Kenya boxing family is mourning the death of former Commonwealth and Africa Games bantamweight bronze medalist Douglas Maina.

Douglas' death was confirmed yesterday by national 400m record-holder Rose Tata Muya.

"Douglas has been unwell. We took him to Mathari Hospital last month for check up. His wife called me today (Thursday) morning to relay the sad news," Muya told *Standard Sports*.

Efforts to reach Maina's wife for comment were futile as her phone didn't go through.

Maina was a product of the late coach Eddie 'Papa' Musi of Kariobangi, famously known as Bangladesh Boxing Club.

He contested national league for the Kenya Defence Forces (KDF) where he was spotted and picked to join national team, the 'Hit Squad'.

Muya, who is also the Heroes and Heroines National Sports Coordinator, was with Maina in the Team Kenya for the 1978 All Africa Games in Algiers and the Commonwealth Games in Edmonton Canada.

Maina, who was known for his snapping deadly right punch, won bronze medals in the two championships.

"He was a gifted boxer. He did well in international tournaments as well as the league," Kenya Professional Boxing Commission (KPBC) President Reuben Ndolo said.

After hanging his gloves, Maina trained as a referee and presided over international bouts in South Africa, Zambia, Malawi and across Africa.

Meanwhile, KPBC has postponed

its Commonwealth and Africa title fights to August due to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

Makaveli is currently stepping up training in Dubai alongside former World Boxing Council women Super Bantamweight champion Fatuma Zarika.

Diamond League postpones Eugene, Paris meetings

The Diamond League yesterday suspended a further two meetings in June as it continues to adapt the 2020 season calendar in the face of the coronavirus crisis.

In recent weeks, the Wanda Diamond League has been forced to suspend a number of its early-season meetings as a result of health and logistical concerns brought about by the global coronavirus crisis.

Yesterday the series announced the postponement of further meetings in Eugene (scheduled for June 7) and Paris (June 13).

As with previous suspensions, this decision was reached in close consultation with all relevant parties and based on concerns over athlete safety as well as widespread travel restrictions which make it impossible to stage the competitions as planned.

The Bislett Games also announced plans to host an alternative athletics competition, an exhibition event dubbed 'The Impossible Games', on June 11, the original date of this year's Oslo Diamond League meeting.

The concept will see a number of world-class athletes take part in a one-off showpiece event in full observation of Norway's coronavirus regulations and social distancing rules.

The programme is currently set to include a world record attempt from Norwegian hurdles star Karsten Warholm and

a long-distance pole vault battle between world record holder Mondo Duplantis and record Diamond League Champion Renaud Lavillenie.

Organisers were nonetheless keen to stress that the full programme is yet to be confirmed and subject to changes.

The hour-long event will be shown live by Norway's public broadcaster NRK, and will

Why Obunga remains focused on winning titles

The 30-year-old point guard relishes guiding Kenya to Afro-basketball championship title.

No matter the hardships, losses and heartaches Debra Obunga has suffered in life, she has never thought of quitting.

The Zetech University new signing believes she still has more to offer to the Kenya national women's basketball team, nine years after making her national debut.

She has an enviable determination and focus only longed for by many.

"I have never thought of giving up! I grew up being told by my seniors to always work hard and to keep pushing my limits," said the former KPA guard.

She says her goal is to use her 12 years of experience to help her new-found home, Zetech, win the Kenya Basketball Federation (KBF) Premier League title.

"Nothing beats the feeling of winning the premier league title. It would be an honor to win my second premier league title, now with Zetech," she said.

The 30-year-old won the premier league title with Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) in 2013 and the women's Division One title during her first stint with Zetech, in 2015.

Born and raised in Kisumu, the first sports she thought of were netball and football.

"I played netball and football while at Arina Primary School. These were the most common sports at that time," she said.

It was not until she joined Kisumu Girls High School in 2004 that her love for basketball was born and blossomed.

"When I joined high school, I decided to try my hand in basketball. I had played netball before so, I told myself that this would be an easy task," she said.

Obunga represented Kisumu Girls in the secondary school games, where they exited the championships at the regional level.

Even though she was a rising star in basketball, Obunga also focused on netball, where she guided her school to the national school games on several occasions.

"With basketball, we did not qualify for the national games. But for netball, we represent Nyanza several times between 2004 and 2008," she said.

For Obunga, however, she decided to focus on one sport after sitting for her Form Four exams. She quit netball and picked up with basketball.

She was called up to the national under-18 basketball team, a feat that saw her attract suitors from the premier league before eventually signing for Kenya College of Accountancy (KCA) University.

In 2011, she signed for NYTA Shimba where she played for one season. She later earned her first call up to the national team.

But was joining KPA in 2013 that saw her win her first title after helping the squad lift the women's premier league title.

Her stint with KPA lasted for one season. She then switched her loyalty to Eagle Wings in 2014 before proceeding to join Zetech University in 2015, where she was instrumental in the team's promotion to the premier league after winning the Division One title in 2017.

She then returned to KPA in 2018, played for two seasons before returning to Zetech University this year.

She picks last year as her best moment with the national team where Kenya narrowly missed the All Africa Games solitary ticket after losing to Egypt in the final.

"We were having a good game and

enjoying ourselves in Uganda until we lost to Egypt in the final. We were almost there but we were unlucky," she said.

Obunga has, however, promised to come back stronger especially after losing in both the Afro Basketball championships in Dakar (with the national team) and the premier league title (with KPA).

"My goal is to return stronger both for the club and national team. I am not giving up yet on winning a championship with the national team," she said.

"We reached the final last year and learnt our lessons. I believe with good preparations and support, we can win titles for Kenya."

Obunga, who envies her national teammate Hilda Indasi. After she's done with playing, Obunga would want to be a trainer and possibly, a national team coach.

And to upcoming players who wish to play for the women's national team, she emphasises on hard work, self-belief and God.

"You first need to be in God. Believe in yourself because the responsibility of playing for the national team comes with the burden of representing all Kenyans. Hard work and discipline follows and step by step, you will get there," she said.

Kenyan Premier League. Authorities should consider cluster testing, camping and hosting matches in neutral venues

Lockdown: Best time to showcase our Premier League

In a commendable move, the Ministry of Sports has initiated a process to cushion footballers in the wake of Covid-19 as seen in a call for official contact information of footballers playing in key Kenyan leagues. While it is not yet clear whether the players will get money transfers or food packages - the move by the Ministry is timely especially bearing in mind the financial struggles most football clubs have been through in recent times. The ministry however, can do more than just handing fish to the sector. While the fish is a welcome relief to thousands of players, many are at home bored, unfit and itching to get back to what they love most. A little support from the government can facilitate a smooth completion of the remaining fixtures especially in the Kenyan Premier League during this partial lockdown.

In the beginning of April, President Uhuru gave out Sh100million to artists to entertain Kenyans during these tough times through TV, Radio and Internet - some artists have done well since the announcement. The source of the funds was the Sport, Arts and Social Development Fund. Nobody can deny that sports and football in particular is a source of premium entertainment for millions of Kenyans.

With a TV production partner and a broad-

cast partner already, the Kenyan Premier League has an opportunity to reach millions of Kenyans during this period of staying at home and without the usual competition from other alternative leagues across the world. Both the corporate CEO and marketing guru who have been reading about the league off the sponsorship proposals and newspapers now are at home and have an opportunity to watch and evaluate the potential return on investment of our game to their business were they to invest in it.

Cluster testing and Camping

Coronavirus is dangerous and anyone who downplays it does so at their own peril. But being a virus, it is a reality that the world has now moved on to learn how to live with and thrive - at least till a vaccine is discovered. While football is a contact sport and goes against the gospel of social distancing - cluster testing and disciplined self-isolation through camping of Premier league players and such key stakeholders as referees, production crews can significantly minimize chance-

es of infection. Resuming closed door games can serve triple functions of introducing the game to masses across Kenya - most of whom have stayed away from the game, resuscitating the hospitality industry as well as giving premium entertainment to Kenyans in these gloomy times.

The players and the key stakeholders needed to pull closed door games will be less than 700 in number. With universities and major hotels closed, affordable accommodation arrangements can be made. With camping, three games per week is a tough but not an impossible scheduled-

ule to pull through for clubs - which means that the remaining fixtures will be done in slightly over a month's time.

Neutral Venues

With our limited infrastructure that has seen us twice awarded and twice denied opportunities to host CHAN coupled with near empty stands during matches, no team can solidly claim home advantage if they played home matches away from home. With a sizeable number of Premier league clubs coming from Nairobi and the Western regions of Kenya, clustering these teams into two and ensuring clubs within these locations face each other for their remaining fixtures first can reduce the travel and accommodation costs.

Ruaraka and Kasarani stadium can serve as neutral game venues to minimize movement and maximize on production logistics for Nairobi-based clubs with Kisumu or Kakamega for western based teams. Ulinzi, Zoo Kericho and

Bandari can join either the western or Nairobi clusters. New Schedules can be planned in such a way that allows maximum number of games to be televised or streamed online to entertain Kenyans. Covid-19 has left many sectors re-evaluating and reflecting on their models of doing business. Even as we seek solutions to the election impasse at the federation, may this pandemic and the government intervention to cushion footballers, be a challenge to football stakeholders on the need to grow the sport so that the issue at hand could have been how much is Kenyan football giving towards combating covid-19 as is the case in other countries.

Ex-Cecafo Secretary Musonye opens up on FKF polls bid

Former Council for East and Central Africa Football Associations (Cecafo) General Secretary Nicholas Musonye admits he is weighing up prospects whether to contest for the Football Kenya Federation (FKF) presidency in the stalled elections.

This is after a section of former footballers urged Musonye, who recently stepped down as the regional body's boss after two decades in charge, to vie for the top seat.

In an interview with *Standard Sports* yesterday, the 55-year-old former sports journalist-turned football administrator could join ex-FKF supremo Sam Nyanweya in the race to replace Nick Mwendwa.

"People have the right to propose who they want to propose, but I will make the decision at the right time when the environment is conducive for everybody. Right now, we are dealing with coronavirus as a country. Football politics will be discussed at the most appropriate time, and that will be when we are done with this mess. You cannot run for a post when people are dying or are in danger," said Musonye.

"But it's something that I can consider and I will put into perspective the proposals from the stakeholders. I've read what people have said and I will come up with my clear position at the appropriate time. The most important thing right now is to support the government in the fight against Covid-19. So that even if I become the FKF president I will still have players. I don't want to be a president without people to lead."

He added: "We are praying and hoping that normalcy will return soon so that we can start talking about football politics. I can't talk about football politics now when people are in danger. I want to follow the government's directive."

Asked if he will shelve his initial ambitions to vie for the 2022 Kakamega gubernatorial seat, Musonye categorically said: "When I take a position I stick to it. But there is no relationship between the Kakamega governorship race and FKF presidency. The governorships elections is in 2022, right?"

Bundesliga secures deals with broadcasters

The Bundesliga has secured agreements with rights holder Sky and all but one broadcaster for payments for the rest of the 2019/2020 season that will help keep clubs afloat amid the coronavirus pandemic, German Football League (DFL) CEO Christian Seifert yesterday.

The Bundesliga has been suspended since mid-March

due to the outbreak of the new coronavirus, which has infected more than 148,000 and killed over 5,000 people in Germany. A restart is expected some time in May but it is up to the government to give the green light.

"If we should start on May 9, we are ready. If it is later we will be ready again," Seifert said, adding that the deal with

broadcasters made sure clubs would have enough liquidity until June 30 and once the season got under way. Should the season be abandoned they would have to pay back some of the amount, he said.

"For us what is decisive is what the politicians will decide. It is not for us to decide when," Seifert said on a potential

restart date.

Germany has the fifth highest COVID-19 caseload behind the United States, Spain, Italy and France, but has kept fatalities down thanks to early and extensive testing.

Regional leaders in Bavaria and North Rhine Westphalia said this week it was possible for the league to resume with-

out spectators after May 9 and under strict health and safety conditions.

The League has warned that many clubs in the first and second divisions faced an uncertain financial future and several would be in an "existence-threatening" situation if play did not resume by June.

Afreakan Queen

International singer KIMANI, formerly Victoria Kimani, is one of the most skilful exports from the 254, and with the build-up to her third studio album 'Afreaka', which drops today, the aesthete found time to chat with **ALFAYO ONYANGO** about the album, her bittersweet relationship with Kenya, her love life and more

Pulse: Heading into your third studio album, what does it feel like?

Kimani: It's surreal, a little numb because pulling this one together was extremely rough. Last year, I recorded two albums, this is the first of the two to be released. It also feels like an extreme advancement in terms of my sound and how I've evolved.

P: What can we expect from *Afreaka* after the successes of *Safari* and *Afropolitan*?

K: *Afreaka* is a joint album with epic platinum-selling producer 1\$T, originally from Liberia, Post Malone, Ariana Grande, Migos, 21 Savage, Iggy Azalea just to name a few. So from a production standpoint, it provides a departure from your typical Afro-pop sound into a wave that I didn't know existed until we finally collaborated; it's a global vibe and I am way more savvy with my song writing as well, it's just different. You can hear the growth.

P: With a vast record of collaborations, what inspired picking Boutross, Ferre Gola and FKI 1\$T?

K: I wanted the project to be simple; all about the music, not a fame game or an overthought for additional hype. This time we selected exactly who would provide what the project was missing musically on its own. Boutross' flow is unmatched on the song we have together, called *Kumi Kumi* and Ferre Gola provides the perfect Francophone touch with a little extra soul in his delivery in the title track, *Afreaka*.

P: Your sample game has always been on fire. Is it important to you to pay homage to your inspirers, or what's that about?

K: It's very important to pay homage yes, but I've always been fascinated with the Refix /Remix and Mixtape/Free Riddim culture. Some songs need to never die, which is a train of thought that most great artistes have.

P: How did it feel to be picked to be the brand ambassador of Maybelline, an international beauty line?

K: It was great. Makeup is something that has always been a part of my life, so to work alongside a brand like Maybelline taught me a lot. Moving around with them during Fashion week in New York was also extremely memorable.

P: How do you manage to stay so fresh with your style and image?

K: At the core of everything deep down is the kid – me sitting in my closet cutting up fabrics and gluing things that don't belong together, drawing full outfits on paper cut-out models, envisioning and sometimes creating the fashion items that I don't have. Also, I get bored with looks quickly, almost as soon as I have tried it once (giggles) so that's my happy place; creating new vibes.

P: Your entrepreneurship is another overlooked aspect. How have Kimani Couture and Kimani braids worked out so far?

K: So far, so great! Anyone who knows me knows that I love hair, and braids are just another way that I get to experiment with unique styles. We've already sold out on our first shipment and onto our second one since our launch took place in January.

P: Talk about changing your name from Victoria Kimani to just Kimani ...

K: More like a decolonisation of my name.

P: Is Kimani looking to settle down soon in her love life?

K: Yep! As soon as you get her a man!

P: You've always been vocal about the undervaluing of Kenyan artistes and their efforts; what is your current stand?

K: Well, I'm not sure to be honest. I stopped concerning myself with what wasn't going right and started focusing on what is, so I'm sort of in my own world living in my bubble – but I think it's clear with my lack of involvement in all festivals. Maybe it's not as noticeable when I'm out of the country doing the same thing that I don't really get to do at home. Same ol' Lupita story, right?

P: Do you feel like you have anything to prove so far in your career as a musician?

K: If I do, it's a point – or several – to prove to myself.

P: What do you want your legacy to be?

K: Timeless music and art. Unapologetic and empowering views, and giving back to those in need.

BIG DEAL

Soko is despicable and should be condemned by all right thinking people.

That's the verdict, according to Ezekiel Mutua, the CEO of the Kenya Film Classification Board (KFCB).

And no, an apology won't be enough – the boys should pay a fine of Sh100,000 or face a five-year jail term for their repeat offence.

"Now listen guys, an apology won't just wash. You will have to face the full force of the law as provided for in the Films and Stage Plays Act Cap 222 of the Laws of Kenya," Dr Mutua wrote on his Facebook page, adding that only the current Covid-19 situation has lessened the punishment.

According to Kenya's foremost moral cop, whose mission on his Twitter bio is to 'protect children from exposure to harmful content', the popular group, made up of Rekles, Swat, Zilla and Seska, is normalising criminal acts in the pursuit of making hits.

"Do these perverted producers have children? How does a sane adult try to normalise rape, prostitution or paedophilia in the name of gengetone hits? The video *Soko* by Ethic is despicable immorality that should be condemned by all right-thinking people," he tweeted earlier this week, adding to his many tweets through the years condemning the trending genre.

He then re-posted a video shared by veteran producer Tedd Josiah expressing disgust at gengetone producers and lyrics that point to rape, warning them that "*mnachoma picha*" (you're making the industry look bad) at a time when efforts are being made to catch the eye of the government.

All this happened hours before the offending video was pulled down from

YouTube.

It's a familiar script for Ethic. When they released *Tarimbo* in November last year, there was so much heat regarding the content of the song, which many felt glorified rape, that the video was pulled down. The group apologised.

"As Ethic Entertainment, we are truly remorseful for any pain caused by the lyrics to our single, and for every single person that was triggered to a displeasing memory or emotion by it, receive our sincere apologies. Rest assured that no disrespect was intended," the group said.

Despite this, the video is still on the group's official YouTube page and stands at 1.3 million views.

'Pulse' reached out to the group's management, Al Records on Monday evening, an hour before Ethic posted an apology.

"Thank you. I am in receipt of your email and your comments have been noted," Mike Andrews, the director at Al Records wrote back

to us. "The matter is under full discussion with Ethic and we will respond tomorrow." On Tuesday, they did.

According to Mike, Ethic's action (to go ahead with the song) is contrary to their contractual obligations.

"You must get the boys to get details from them and the producer, Motif," he explained.

He went further to elaborate that when *Tarimbo* got censure from Mutua, they held discussions with the KFCB and agreed that there was no place for "bad lyrics".

"When they released the audio (*Soko*) some time back, we advised them to change the lyrics. We are also shocked that they went ahead to do the video without reference to us," said Mike, who explained that Al Records primarily works on the distribution of music, not so much on production.

So was the apology released after *Tarimbo* even sincere?

"That

apology was meant. Sam (general manager) and I agreed that bad lyrics are not condoned," he said.

Ethic's latest apology, though different, sounds familiar, too.

"We owe an apology to our fans who have been nothing but supportive throughout our journey," the apology read, and went on to explain the reason for pulling down the video and promising not to repost it.

"Over and above, we sincerely apologise and we are working to release better music content in the future."

This was quite a climb-down from an earlier response to people who questioned the lyrics.

"People interpret lyrics however they aim to. If that's what you interpreted it as from listening to the lyrics, then you should evaluate yourself," was Ethic's initial response to a tweet by @BravinYuri.

That gengetone splits opinion is not in doubt. Whether it's the artistry, the lyrics, the quality of the videos or the context, many dismiss the genre – which has been around since 2017 – as a passing cloud. But there is a group that dances to the music every time it plays in clubs, with the artistes' quick turnaround and use of popular phrases to make mega hits striking a chord with fans.

Despite there being tens of gengetone groups that pop up, Ethic has got quite the bashing from Mutua and netizens. Their lyrics, like those of many other groups like theirs, speak of smoking weed and having sex in ever-changing sheng, with X-rated videos hammering the point home.

Yet, Ethic continues to grow in popularity. It has 230,000-plus YouTube subscribers and more than 18,000 followers on Twitter.

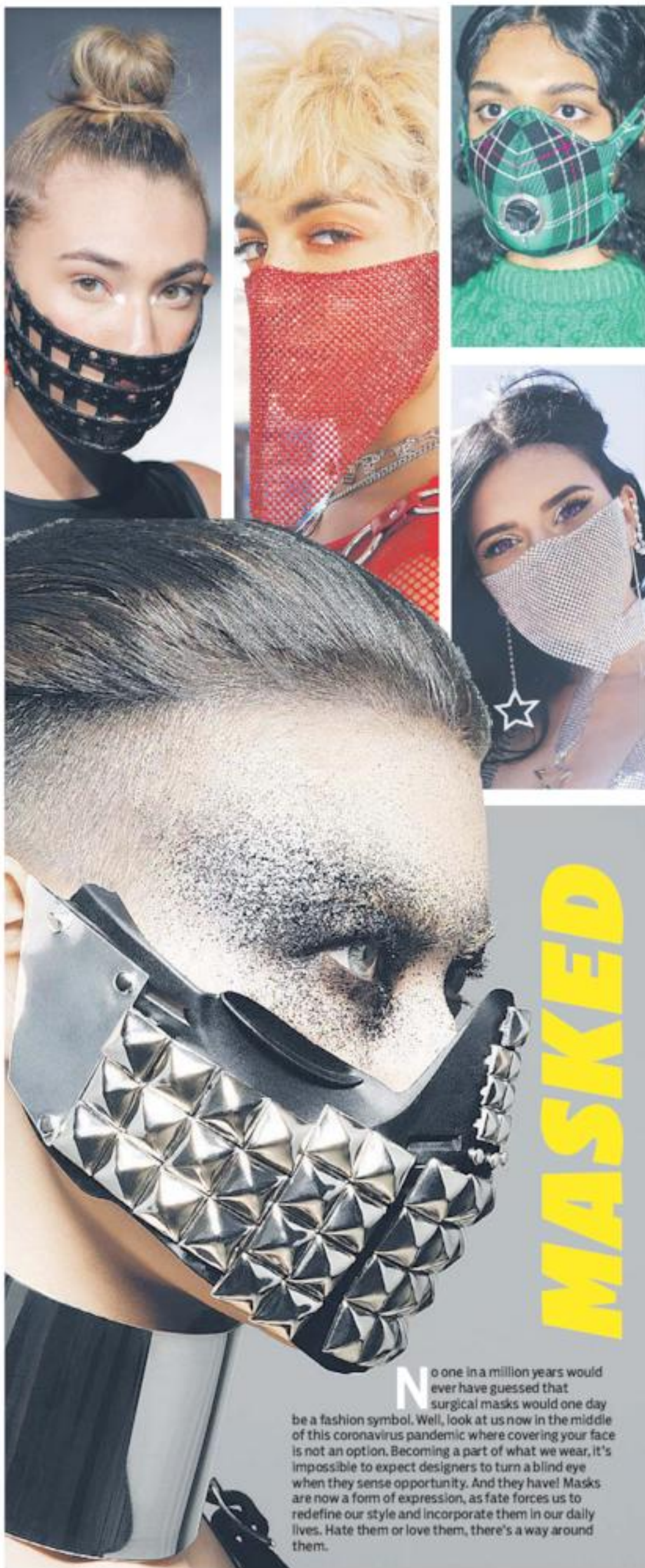

"I'm drowning," he keeps trying to say, but his words turn into bubbles as she yanks him deeper under H₂O.

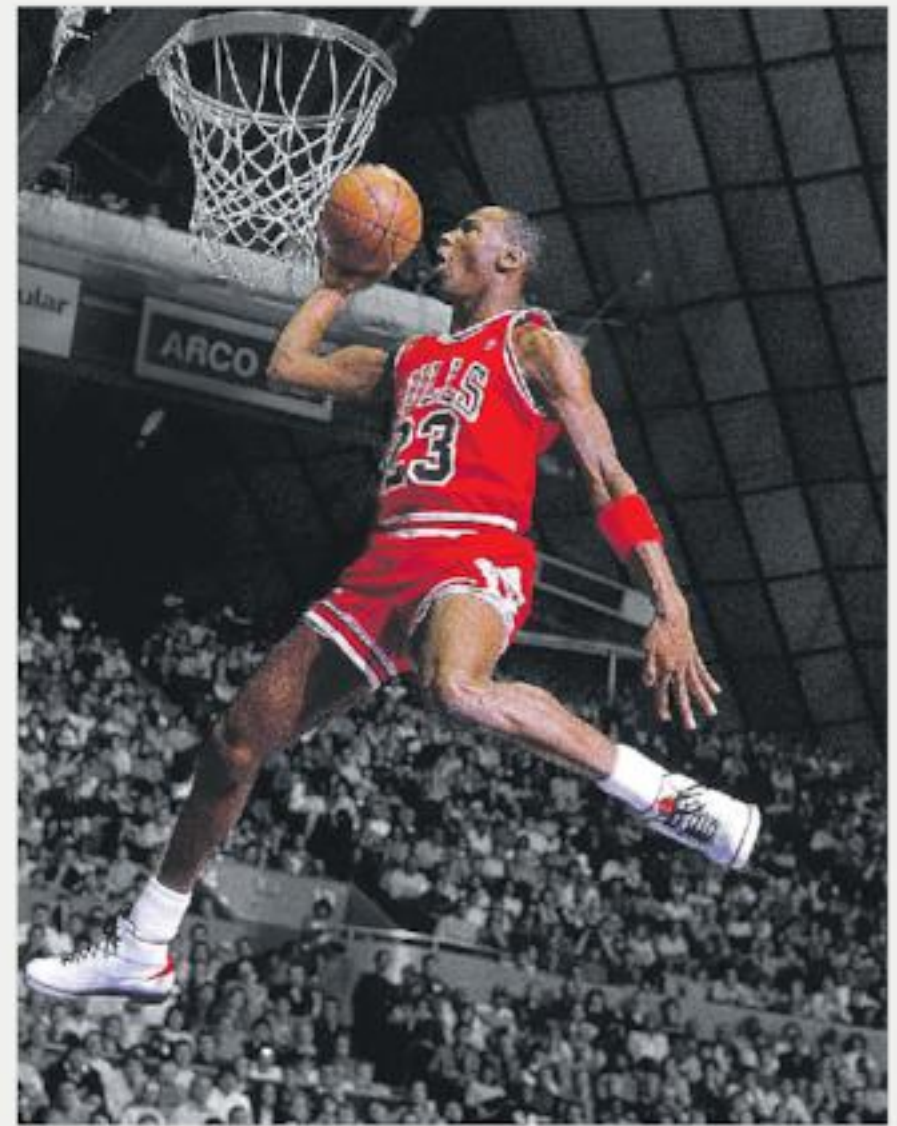

MJ slam-dunks in 'The Last Dance'

In a world without sporting action, live performance events, locked clubs and now dusty dance floors, the powers that be decided to release the legendary Michael Jordan's documentary, *The Last Dance*. Don't get me wrong - there is no substitute for the adrenaline live sport brings. Sports lives and breathes in the present moment. Every single one of its participants moves with a powerful urgency and that creates palpable tension. A tension that glues eyeballs to screens the world over. But for now, *The Last Dance* has acted as a great replacement. After Magic Johnson and Larry Bird ruled the 1980s and ushered in the modern NBA, Michael Jordan took over in the 90s, bagging six titles and becoming not just the greatest basketball player of all time, but one of the most electrifying athletes in any sport ever.

The documentary was initially planned to be released in June, but with the cancellation of almost all major events, the release date was pushed forward. The first two episodes of the documentary aired on Sunday, April 18, with the remaining eight episodes airing weekly until mid-May.

This is not just a talking-heads documentary.

It combines archival footage of the 1997-1998 season where Bulls owner Jerry Reinsdorf, head coach Phil Jackson and Jordan agreed to let an NBA Entertainment crew film the team during the season, with present-day interviews.

Other than Michael Jordan, the documentary features Hall of Famers Scottie Pippen and Dennis Rodman, who were part of the 1998 Chicago dynasty.

The 500 hours of behind-the-scenes footage, from dressing room tensions and pep talks to match-winning situations are captured vividly, and for a moment it enthralls the viewer the same way a live match does.

The documentary has elements of actual live sporting events in its DNA, the turning points of a match will remind you of the epic 90 seconds that denied Manchester United the title and handed it over to their noisy neighbours in the 2011-2012 season.

The individual conflicts in the documentary will remind you of the rivalry between John Terry and his club mate Wayne Bridge.

But this is the point: it feels like a live act, a real event and for the sports enthusiast, nothing can replace the high of a live match now more than *The Last Dance*.

COVID AND THE HOOD



As daily health briefings paint a picture of a virus stealthily roaming estates, **TONY MOCHAMA** picks out the various neighbourhoods that have stood out – and why they're in the eye of a storm

When the photogenic CAS at the Ministry of Health Mercy Mwangangi said, "Covid-19 has reached almost every estate in the (Nairobi) city", that was expected, five weeks after the country detected its first case of coronavirus that came from Ohio (and was probably picked up en route at Heathrow, London).

What surprised denizens of the city-in-the-sun about this disease is that Karen had more detected cases than Kibra, and Kilimani more than Kawangware (or 'Ungwaro' as it is more commonly known).

But what could be the factors at play in the Nairobi neighbourhoods mentioned as most affected?

KILIMANI

Stretching from the Ozone Grill and right to the fresh ozone of the Nairobi Arboretum, Kilimani has become the top culprit of the cases of corona in the city; and this is because of something

that is in the DNA of the 'Kilimani' area code: the in-house party culture of this part of the city.

Two months ago, 'Pulse' did an investigation of sex parties that are prevalent in the neighbourhood.

Even with corona now part of the rhythm of the city, some of the most hardcore (and sadomasochist) elements continue to privately organise these goings-on, according to our saucy sources.

Even in more innocuous gatherings, there are people still organising parties for six to a dozen folk any given weekend in Kilimani, the presence of both the space and multiple apartment duplexes making it possible to do so; yet not getting corona requires measures like social distancing and self-isolation.

You will neither understand life, nor corona in Nairobi until you pay a visit to the Pipeline sprawling estate.

Block-a-chock with flats, Pipeline is the perfect pipeline for any pandemic to run amok through Nairobi. In between buildings, both commercial and residential, you will find the places that gave Pipeline its pulse just before the advent of corona, and that one hears whispers still operates in the underground.

In a parallel universe, New Parallel Pub still operates, you are attended to at Batande Bar, and youth can still get stoned at Kingstone Base, as others look for their mojo at Banjos' Wines and Spirits.

For sure, one can still lay their weary head at Barcelona Boarding, Kavumba Motel, Late Night Lodge and New Nyakusumu City. And even if both the KAG church and oddly named 'Heaven's Gate' Ministry (odd because 'Heaven's Gate' was a religious UFO cult that, 23 years ago, lost 39 of its members to mass suicide as they 'chased' the comet Hale-Boop) are shut on Sundays, the essential services chemists of Santa and Zion are open all the time.

Pipeline has Covid-19 cases aplenty because it's crowded!

COVER STORY**KAREN**

Karen used to be among the most gentrified locations in the City in the Sun, and it still stays an exclusive residency (despite efforts by riffing, and sometimes roughing, musicians like Ringtone to 'Occupy Karen').

Its higher cases of Covid-19 can be attributed to two things that some of the residents from there regularly travel to countries with crazy high cases of the Rona – like the USA, the UK, Spain and Italy.

Secondly, Karen has the highest population of both ageing whites and affluent Africans.

In Kenya, if the average life expectancy these days is 66, then a person in the poorest one per cent will die aged 55, on average, while the one in the top one per cent is expected to live to be 77 years.

In Karen, it isn't just Sir Charles Njonjo, the 'Duke of Kabeteshire', who has seen a century of life.

A whole lot of 'kaburus' born in the 1920s cling onto oxygen like aerosol dinosaurs; but because of the twin dangers of travel, as well as the old being the most vulnerable group, Covid-19 in Karen can strike the geriatrics hard and fast, as is the trend globally, from NYC to Guangzhou.

UTAWALA

From the Eastern Bypass and all the way to Kagundo, that zip code with all its branching roads, business-

es, clubs, churches, complexes and estates composes 'Utawala', yet another high-risk Covid-19 area.

This area has become popular with the youth for places to be able to do their daytime activities of socialisation with accompanying substances, able to disappear from any police patrols on foot, or even 'msako za magari' as many come to imbibe/indulge in crowded cars, with music, along that long road stretch.

BURUBURU

Buruburu was the middle class estate that found itself in 'Eastland' in the 1980s, and it is also where the matatu 'outlaw' culture was born. It therefore follows that rebellion is at the heart of this estate, especially by the youth, including against the measures, rules and regulations that could mitigate against the spread of the coronavirus.

It was also at the centre of one of the most concentrated social gathering densities in the city – with a few square metres accommodating Uncle Ben's Small Pub, Docs Members' Club, Taurus Lounge Bar, Winds and Club Winds, Latitude Pub, Our Times Sports Bar and Superior Wines & Spirits.

"We socialise from Friday evening to Sunday past midnight, from vijana to wazee, wav'lana na was'chana," Jim

Wanjohi, a long-term Buruburu resident (actually, since his birth in March, 1980) tells us.

He explains how every one of the long-term residents, many across generations, know and visit each other.

"You cannot expect a small flu virus to stop our natural Nyumba Kumi good relations in Buruburu."

If this is the kind of good-natured ignorance and high defiance in the estate, then it's no surprise it is a Covid-19 risk area (and no wonder that the beleaguered Nairobi governor, who began his 'matatu style' political mentality there, believes, a la Belorussia, that Heineken and Hennessy can cure corona).

SOUTH C

South C was the real outlier when it came to expected cases.

This is because, despite the late E-Sir's "tuendee tukawake huko Nairobi West, tupitie South C", no self-respecting youth ever actually stops at staid, old, boring South C to drink, smoke or socialise.

Yet, the estates it is sandwiched between – Nairobi West to its north, and South B to its west – despite their reputations of notoriety, remain corona-free at the time of writing.
